Butter sold at 45c; eggs 45; fowl \$1.00 to \$1.25 each; chickens 90c to \$1.00 each; ducks \$1.40; apples 8c per doz. There was a good supply of vegetables at prices about the same as Friday. Fish was scarce, cod and haddock selling at 8c with mackerel at 35c. Outside hay sold at from \$1.60 to \$1.70; potatoes 45c to 50c; oats 50 to 55c and turnips 25c per bushel.

FORCED TO ROB, HE SAYS TO KEEP HIS FAMILY

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Seven children, a wife and only twenty-seven cents in the house and no work, formed the explanation, today of Edward Dolphin, 33, for his robbery of several men on the South Side recently. Dolphin was arrested last night by the Gresham police and is believed by them to be responsible for about thirty recent holdups in and about their district.

"I have been out of work for three months," said Dolphin. "I've got seven kiddies and my wife, and I just had to do this."

When the police searched the Dolphin home they found only twenty-seven cents in the possession of Mrs. Dolphin.

SUDDEN DEATH OF JAS. TILTON

TORONTO, Oct. 18.—James A. Tilton, aged 50, unmarried, of St. John, N. B., a traveller employed by the Westend Flour Mills Company, died suddenly while in his room at the Prince George Hotel. Death was due to apoplexy. J. K. Stratford, president of the company informed the late Mr. Tilton's relatives of the sad event. Deceased had complained of feeling unwell but it was not thought his indisposition was serious. Chief Coroner Graham decided that no inquest was necessary.

WATER IN ST. JOHN RIVER IS STEADILY RISING

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 18.—The water level in the St. John River took a rapid jump over night and came up a foot during last night. The river has been rising steadily for some time and at present is 13 inches over summer level and is still rising rapidly. Viscount Grey Favors Dominion In Ireland LONDON, Oct. 14.—Viscount Grey addressing a Liberal meeting at Berwick-on-Tweed tonight, discussed the Irish question. "The Irish delegates," he said, "are not dealing with the British Government alone; they are beginning to deal for the first time with British public opinion." One danger, he declared was that the Irish representatives might force the negotiations to a point where the British people really believed their self-preservation was imperilled. He believed that dominion partnership with Ireland was consistent with the safety of Great Britain, provided the naval defence of both countries were under one authority. LONDON, Oct. 11.—A Reuter cable from Simla says the Government of India has issued notification that Burma is to be constituted a Governor's province under the Government of India Act of 1919, but with the modification that the minimum percentage of elected members of the Legislative Council shall be sixty instead of seventy, as in the Indian provinces, and that the total strength of the council shall be ninety-two. WOULD HAVE STRONGER NATIONS ACT FIRST

HONOLULU, Oct. 17.—The Japanese army and navy delegation to the Washington Conference, headed by Major-Gen. Hirota Tanaka and Vice-Admiral Kanji Kato, arrived in Honolulu today. Admiral Kato in a statement said: "We are going to the conference with the single desire to co-operate

with the other nations in accomplishing disarmament, and we must not forget that real success will depend upon sincerity and earnestness of purpose of all the nations participating.

"I believe it will rest with the nations possessing the strongest armaments to take the lead in the present plan and by limitation of their own armaments serve as an example to other nations."
