### Evidence Continued In Hydro Enquiry

TORONTO, Ont., April 20 — (By The Canadian Press)—Reading of correspondence bearing on the sale of the M. J. O'Brien power rights on the Madawaska and Mississippi Rivers to the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario took up most of the first day of the resumed Hydro enquiry under Mr. Justice J. F. Orde as commissioner. The enquiry was opened on February 26 last and adjourned indefinitely when commissioner, Mr. Justice W. E. Middleton was taken ill.

J. G. G. Kerry, consulting engineer whose firm, Kerry & Chase, was associated with the O'Brien concern throughout the negotiations, was on the stand all day and it was his letters to J. A. O'Brien and Mr. O'Brien's replies that usurped most of the attention today.

This phase of the enquiry concerns the payment of \$50,000 by the Hydro Commission to John Aird Jr., in connection with the O'Brien power purchase. The other two subjects of enquiry, payment of \$125,000 to Aird by the Beaumonts corporation and the purchase by Hydro of the Dominion Power and Transmission properties, will be gone into later.

Correspondence read today and Mr. Kerry's evidence revealed that

Mr. Aird was at least active in seeking to interest various parties including the Hydro Commission in the O'Brien properties, although near the close of the day when asked by Arthur G. Slaughter, K. C., counsel for independent interests, what Mr. Aird had done for hydro to earn the \$50,000 paid him, the witness said he could not mention anything.

The room where the enquiry is being held in Osgoode Hall was crowded and there was a large array of legal counsel, W. N. Tilley, K. C., is assisting the commissioner in bringing out the facts.

### ROCK GARDEN IS POPULAR

"What is it that makes rock gardens so attractive?" asks Dr. W. T. Macoun, Dominion Horticulturist. And his answer to this question is: "One important reason is that the greatest amount of bloom is early in the spring when enthusiasm for gardening is at its highest and when flowers in the garden are most appreciated. Another attraction of the rock garden is that more depends on individual effort than, perhaps, with any other type of gardening. The rocks may be arranged so that they give a very unnatural effect, not to be desired, or they may be placed in such a way that the setting for the plants seems very natural."

### Outcome Of Oath Causes Anxiety

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, April 20—(Canadian Press Cable)—President Eamon De Valera of the Irish Free State today will present before the Dail Eireann his government's bill seeking to abolish the oath of allegiance to the British Crown.

No opposition was expected to first reading of the bill, although its fate after that became rather uncertain in the light of recent events. Announcement on Saturday that a large firm manufacturing biscuits, and employing 3,100 persons, would be forced to discharge half its staff and move part of its business to Liverpool, if abolition of the oath resulted in secession of the Free State from the British Empire, put the Labor party in an awkward position.

The Laborites, who hold the balance of power in the Dail had already promised their support to the government in its attempt to abolish the oath. Should they hold to their promise and aid in a measure leading to secession their position in the eyes of the working man who gave them his vote, would be that of one whose efforts to improve conditions resulted only in making them worse, unless the biscuit people reconsidered their decision.

On the other hand, should they renounce their promise to the government and bring about the defeat of the bill, they could count on little future sympathy from the more extreme element among the electorate. Further, they might lose the support of the government to their own measures for relief of unemployment, support they were promised in return for their alliance in the matter of the oath.

### Ice Cream Makers Seeking Aid

OTTAWA, Ont., April 20 — (By The Canadian Press)—A large delegation of ice cream manufacturers mainly representative of the Ontario Ice Cream Manufacturers' association, waited upon members of the government today with a request for removal of the six per cent sales tax on their product, provided in the budget now before the House of Commons. The delegation which also represented the ice cream makers of Manitoba, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces spent the day in consultation with the ministers, calling, in order upon Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance, Hon. E. B. Ryckman Minister of National Revenue, Hon. Robert Welch Minister of Agriculture and Hon. H.

H. Stevens Minister of Trade and Commerce. They were introduced by Frank Boyes, (Cons., Middlesex, East).

C. E. Richardson, member of the Ontario legislature for South Perth and one of the delegation, stated that the party had been well received by the ministers who had promised to give their case whatever consideration possible.
