PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

The Ottawa Delegation further Discussed in the Legislature—Mr. Mathieson Censures Premier for His Remarks of the forenoon and the Latter Retracts.

Thursday evening. House met at 8.30.

Hon. Mr. Hughes continuing the debate on the Draft Address spoke in favor of larger exhibitions and referred to the success of last year's show. He also dwelt at some length on the tourist trade speaking on the efforts made by the Government and the Tourist Association in bringing travel to our shores.

Mr. Prowse congratulated the mover and seconder of the address and regretted he could not do the same of the Government. He asserted that the hay had not helped the Government, but had only helped members to their seats. He thought the Government had missed their great opportunity on the representation question. When he saw our case was to be jeopardised by being bracketed with the N. B. one it should have been withdrawn for the time being. He criticised severely the Government action on the hay question and asserted that there had been gross injustice in its distribution. The farmers of Kings and Prince Counties feel that they should have exhibitions such as in the past which have been a success. The delay in opening the Murray Harbor Railway came in for censure and in regard to the tourist question the speaker thought greater effort should be made to bring permanent residents to the province. The business of the country for nearly two months was delayed in order that the headless Government might have its head reinstated. He urged that the public accounts committee be called together in order that the real debt of the province may be ascertained. On the matter of Winter Communication he strongly censured the Premier for the manner in which he referred to the Ottawa delegation. He had hoped that the Government would unite with the people to do something to improve the Winter Communication and from the mainland, but in this his hopes were disappointed.

Hon. Benj. Gallant first referred to the hay question condemning the Opposition for their fault-finding especially as King's County was more in need of hay than the other counties. The importation of the hay had been delayed till winter in order that it might be transported by the winter steamers free of cost. The Government imported the hay purely for the benefit of the people and not for political purposes. The Fishery Award could not be settled in a moment. The debt is not excessive in comparison with the revenue and its funding will be heartily endorsed by the people.

The House then went into committee on the address with Mr. McWilliam in the chair.

On the clause respecting Winter Communication Mr. Mathieson pointed out that the Ottawa delegation was chosen by a representative meeting politically. The delegation should be treated as representative men. At the Charlottetown meeting six Liberal members were present including three members of the Government. Are their acts to be discredited and are their wishes to be jeered at? The Premier's treatment of his own followers is discreditable to himself and to the Government. The action taken by this delegation may have the greatest benefit if their efforts are not destroyed now by the Premier. The delegation was not treated at Ottawa as a "mongrel" delegation, it was joined by a late Liberal Premier of the province, the Liberal members and the Liberal Senators and the Conservative members and Senators at Ottawa.

Premier Peters, on rising to a point of order, said he had not intended to use "mongrel" delegation and he did not say so as far as he remembered.

He declared all intention of using such words. He meant that the delegation was not a responsible one such as a delegation from the Government would be.

Mr. Mathieson said that if the Public Accounts were brought down shortly the Opposition would do everything possible to facilitate the business of the House and the House might rise in two weeks.

The address was reported agreed to with amendment and was ordered to be presented to the Lieutenant Governor.

Premier Peters introduced bills to amend an act issued in the 50th year of the reign of Her Late Majesty Queen Victoria Cap I intitled an Act respecting the Legislature, and an act to amend an act passed in the 38th year of the reign of Her Late Majesty Queen Victoria Cap III intitled an Act further securing the Independence of the General Assembly.

They were set down for second reading to-morrow.

House adjourned till 10 a. m.

Friday April 7.

House met at 12.15.

Mr. Prowse asked:

(1) Has William H. Bears been dismissed by the Government from the office of Prosecutor under the Canada Temperance Act, and if so for what cause and upon whose complaint?

(2) Has the Government or any member thereof received any complaint in writing relative to the said William H. Bears, as Prosecutor?

(3) Whom has the Government appointed in his place, and upon the recommendation of what persons?

(4) Was Thomas McCarron recommended to the Government for the position of Prosecutor, and if so by whom?

(5) A copy of all correspondence between the Government and any person or persons relative to the dismissal of the said William H. Bears and the appointment of his successor.

Hon. Mr. Peters replied that Bears had been dismissed as any other servant of the Government and this the Government had a right to do whenever they saw fit. The Government, so far as he knew had received no complaint in writing. A. J. Campbell had been appointed in his stead. There was no recommendation for Thomas McCarron. There was no correspondence so far as he knew with the government on the matter.

Mr. Mathieson inquired why the ex-Commissioner of Agriculture had resigned. Some of the members, he noticed, had expressed surprise but the usages of the Dominion and British Houses showed that such explanation was always given.

Premier Peters said the late Commissioner resigned on account of ill health and in ability to contest the last election. It was with great regret that the resignation was accepted. There was no difference of opinion whatever.

Hon. Mr. Hazard introduced bills intitled The Partition Amendment Act 1905 and the Trustee Amendment Act 1905 which were read a first time.

Hon. Mr. Peters in moving the House into committee of the whole on the bill respecting the Legislature said the object of the bill was to avoid an anomaly such as existed in St. Peters district at last general election. Elections are expensive and it is only reasonable that the expense of a second election in case of a tie should be obviated. By the bill the ordinary vote is taken from the Sheriff and he is given the casting vote in case of a tie.

Mr. McKinnon said the bill should be considered very carefully. By it the Sheriff might have four or five votes even with no qualification. This bill would give unscrupulous returning officers an opportunity to create a tie. In his own election some years ago he had a similar experience which had to be taken to the Supreme Court to get justice. This bill he thought would be very wrong.

Mr. Morson continued taking objections to the bill and was still speaking when the House adjourned.

House adjourned till three o'clock Monday afternoon.

YOUNG SCHURMAN LIKES HIS WORK

The Son of the President of Cornell Talks to a Newspaper Man About Himself.

GROTON, N. Y., April 1.—Robert Schurman, of Cornell, 47, son of President Jacob Gould Schurman of the University, has been employed at the works of the American Road-Roller Company here for six weeks as an assistant in setting up machines, blacksmith's helper and putting in part of his time breaking pig iron. He is a great favorite with all his fellow workmen, and they all speak well of the willing way in which he takes hold of the work and believe that there will be some records smashed in the weight events at Cornell next year when young Schurman will re-enter the university.

He is a member of the fast Road-Roller Basket-Ball Team, who have been defeated but once this season, and takes great interest in all the social events here.

To a newspaper correspondent young Schurman had the following to say:

"I consider the articles which have appeared in the various papers an outrage both to my father and myself. I have been interviewed by no one before, and this is the first I have given for publication.

"I failed to pass my examinations at Cornell in February, and consequently could not return before next September. After I was busted out I stayed in Ithaca for Junior week, and a few days later came to Groton to accept the position with the Roads-Roller Company.

"I never made the statement that I wandered around the country for a time and then applied for work with the Groton Company, nor did I apply for work here.

"When I left college my father had made all arrangements for my position in Groton, and I came here direct from Ithaca. The work here is perhaps rather stiff at times, but I am enjoying it immensely. The foremen are not very severe, and I am learning something every day that one cannot get at Cornell or any other university.

"There is no truth in the report that I am cut off from my family and dependent upon myself entirely. I have been home several times over Sunday since I came here, and I receive at any time such help as I may require financially from my father.

"I put in most of my time helping to set up the rollers, which is not very heavy work, and after one has worked at this a short time, it becomes rather interesting and you wish to know more about the mechanism of these great machines."
