MORNING MARKET LETTER

NEW YORK, May 1—Over night news that the over extended London speculative position had been cared for had a marked influence on opening prices in the New York market Friday. Leading stocks opened two to five points higher on fair sized volume and the market displayed a firm tone throughout the day. During the afternoon prices rallied more sharply and stocks closed at about their highest levels of the day. The strength was participated in by all groups but the rails were outstanding, showing the greatest percentage gain. Sentiment continued more optimistic than that prevailing for some weeks past although scepticism might increase if the present technical rally score too sharp an advance, inviting further selling. Up to this point the market has become fairly well accustomed to the several factors which have served to depress security prices recently and having appraised the probable efforts of them, it is now apparently inclined to accept present quotations of leading stocks as reasonable enough at least for trading purposes. In the absence of any new uncertainties developing over the near term it would seem that the market is fairly well situated to absorb in orderly fashion and may establish a trading zone within the range of the fluctuations of the past four or five trading sessions, in our opinion. MORNING STOCK LETTER

NEW YORK, May 1—There is very little news this morning which might influence the market. Mussolini has decreed that wages be advanced 10 per cent to 12 per cent to meet the rising cost of living. The Journal of Commerce has reported for the first time that National Supply may report for the first quarter \$5.75 a share of which \$1 will be non-recurring. General Motors is scheduled to have a dividend meeting Monday. We would look for some extension of yesterday's rally with irregularly developing toward the close. Monday's market will no doubt depend, on week end news but in any event we would look for some secondary selling before the middle of the week. Moving Picture technicians in Hollywood have gone out on a strike.

Produce Prices

PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 1—Steel operations in this district are scheduled to start the new week at 94 per cent of capacity a gain of half a point over this week. Last year it was 64 per cent and two years ago 37 per cent. Carnegie Steel will start at 98 per cent, on one point, Jones and Laughlin remains unchanged at 88. Carnegie Illinois Steel including all districts will drop two points to 86 per cent next week after operating this week at a new high for them on the recovery.

MONTREAL, May 1—O'Brien—Recovery of \$56.29 a ton for first quarter in 1937 brought total value for the period to \$319,760 as compared to \$247,106 for the previous 12 weeks. This is the highest average recovery per ton of any Canadian mine.

Lamaque Gold—First quarter production amounted to \$702,730. With current output on 550 tons daily basis it is expected to increase production to 1,000 tons daily later this year.

Perron Gold—For three months production was 258,300 against 147,000 for the last quarter in 1936. Average recovery first quarter this year 8.71 per ton.

Imperial Oil and International Petroleum—With payments of 50 cents semi annual plus a special dividend of 25 cents per share of capital stock of Royalite Oil Company, suggests that dividends on affiliated companies Imperial Oil and Pete will be the same as six months ago—62 1-2 cents for Imperial and \$1.25 for Pete. Financial Counsel.

Kirk Lake—Current dividend of 3 cents payable June 1 record date May 8.

Saguenay Power—First quarter net income before depreciation and taxes \$589,601 against \$1,894,942 for the whole year 1936—when paid \$4 a share as against \$3 in 1936 and \$2 in 1935.

Quebec Minerals—Gold output March 54,922 ounces up only slightly but selling up 10 per cent over March last year.

Howey Gold—Net profit for 1936 equal to 39 cents per share on 6,000,000 shares, as against 4.2 cents in 1935.

MONTREAL, May 1—Asbestos—March production more than double that of March 1936 and first quarter 64 per cent ahead of same period last year.

CHICAGO, May 1—(AP) — Reports of growing seriousness of moisture deficiency in parts of the domestic southwest and Canada helped lift wheat prices about a cent a bushel today.

Private advices that rain is needed badly in the western two-thirds of Kansas and that Wichita experienced the driest April in 42 years caused some traders to say estimates of winter wheat production might be lowered. One private source here wanted the production of winter wheat output 7,000,000 bushels compared with the month ago figures.

Wheat closed 1-8 to 7-8 higher than yesterday's finish. May 1.32 3-8 to 1-2, July 1.19 7-8 to 20, and corn was 7-8 to 2 1-4 lower, May 1.30 1-4 to 3-8, July 1.17 1-2 to 5-8. Oats were 1-8 up to 1-4 down.
