As Parliament Meets

When Parliament meets today Prime Minister King will be faced with quite a different House of Commons from the one which met after the election of March 20, 1940.

In Alberta in 1940 the Liberals won seven out of 17 seats. In British Columbia out of 16 possible the Liberals got 10, plus one Independent who generally supported Mr. King.

The tale on the evening of June 11 last was different. The figures show with what narrow support Mr. King will have to carry on.

Dangerous Ammunition

Brush fires and unfortunate shooting accidents may result if sportsmen are not careful in the use of any service ammunition which comes into their hands.

Now that the war has ended, small amounts of army ammunition may reach the hands of semi-service shooting clubs through release by authorities. Again, small amounts may reach the open market through illegal transactions.

Officials of "Dominion" Ammunition Division of Canadian Industries Limited have issued a warning that while specialized service types of ammunition are not likely to get into the hands of dealers or sportsmen, it would be well to watch for them among questionable suppliers or rounds.

As a general rule, one should not use any doubtful ammunition with a lacquered bullet nose. These have specialized uses unsuited to sports rifles. A green or black bullet tip on British, American or Canadian ammunition indicates the bullet is armor-piercing and has a high power of penetration.

A blue nose indicates an incendiary bullet which will ignite any inflammable object it strikes. A red nose or a white nose indicates tracer ammunition which will ignite wood if not completely burned out before it strikes.

Ammunition with copper-red cartridge cases should not be used in a sporting rifle. It is very likely a proof round of much stronger charge than normally designed for testing barrels. If used indiscriminately it might easily damage the breech.

Although it is very unlikely proof ammunition would get into the hands of the public, it would be even more dangerous if used in foreign arms brought back as souvenirs or dumped on the Canadian market.

The same conclusions are reached if we consider the reasons for which family allowances have today become necessary. A few centuries ago the maintenance and especially the support of large families was not a problem.

One Sensible Jap (By James D. White, Associated Press Staff Writer) One Japanese now says the atomic bomb was necessary to pound some sense into Japanese ears.

Yukio Ozaki is 88 years old, so he can say this. Assassins hesitate to kill him because of his age and because they don't want to make a martyr out of him.

Of an estimated 74,000,000 Japanese, he is the only one since Japan's surrender to say anything that makes solid sense to western ears. This is what he said yesterday in Tokyo.

In Japan, a complete overhauling of education is necessary to pound into the people's heads the law of humanity, the difference between right and wrong. This is the reconstruction of Japan, and it will be stopped.

He has hated assassins before. They respect not only his 88 years but they fear the long-mothered support which rests behind him. In Japan, one does not get re-elected to the Diet for 55 years, especially if one is a wife who is half Japanese, half British, unless one is a strong popular support.

Ozaki, a former Mayor of Tokyo, was nearly executed in 1933 when he rose in the Diet and demanded the resignation of the military expansionist—Terauchi cabinet. Two officers with drawn swords jumped at him on the platform, but were overpowered.

In 1931 when Japanese militarists invaded Manchuria, Ozaki was out of the country, and he spoke forcefully against their program. When he started back to Japan in 1933 he said he expected to be killed.
