LETTER FROM FRONT.

Besides the main town there are Lower Town and a place called Coon Town down by the railroad (and I might here mention that they have a nice little railway station, the cars are of the English style and narrow-gauge road) Both of those localities are peopled only by Kaffirs (niggers at home) They live in houses built of red mud, but they are kept clean; and I tell you from a distance they look fine. The Kaffirs work in the city. The colored population is about 2,300 and I tell you some of them are very busy and industrious and some of them seem to be fairly prosperous. They have a church of their own, also a colored preacher, but they have no vote. They are a very proud race. There is one occupation which they have that seemed strange to me; it is this: They have a little two-wheeled wagon with shafts in it. They haul it themselves instead of using horses and it is funny to see them running down the street with a man or woman in it just the same as if it were empty. They wear a head-dress made of feathers of all different colors. They get for their services from 3 to 4 shillings per hour.

If I had time I could write you lots more that perhaps might interest you, and as I have a few more shorter letters to write I guess I will close. All the Island boys are well and are looking forward to being home in June at the very latest. We know nothing much about the war only what we see for ourselves, but we hear all kinds of rumors.

Mr. Fullerton is still the same jolly fellow he was when you last saw him. He is continually hovering around to see if he can in any way help any of the boys. I tell you he does quiet a lot for us on the quiet and gives us lots of news that we are not able to get, as he is in a better position to see and hear all that goes on. The parents of those who are cut is cannot imagine what it meant to us to have him with us, and there is no tongue that can praise him too highly. He will ever live in the memory at least of us poor privates who have been associated with him for at least six of the hard months of our lives. It is a long time since he became the favorite parson of the Regiment as well as helped us boys to while away some of the longest moments of our lives.

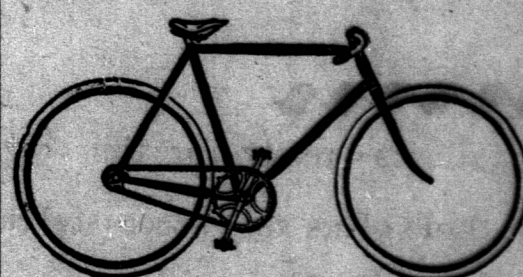
