DAIRY CATTLE


An increased demand is in evidence in this Province for dairy cattle of good confirmation and type, and reports from the centres of demand indicate an increased shortage of supply. It is quite evident that a remunerative livestock business may be conducted by farmers who pay some attention to the proper breeding and development of their herds. The prices offered for good cows, is ranging at a level at which excellent profits may be secured. There is a tendency, however, at the present time, to rush cattle on the market. Farmers who practice this policy are liable to oversell and not only they, but the country at large, may experience a shortage of supply. Breeders who study the situation thoroughly are convinced that the present market is not temporary in character, but from indications, it would seem to be one that is fairly permanent. The best policy to adopt under present conditions is not that of over-selling, but the laying down of a strong constructive breeding policy, which will produce large numbers of cows of a kind that will command the highest prices on the market, feed the surplus to the trade with normal regularity, and at the same time, retain a sufficient number at home to amply provide for the proper functioning of home trade and the home creamery and factory.

The present season has been productive of a great stimulus in the purchasing of improved sires, which indicates that a proportion of our farmers at least, are taking the proper measures to bring about desirable cattle production. The Officers of the Department of Agriculture have been busy selling and distributing pure-bred bulls.

Over Twenty Learning Clubs have been established and supplied and as many more could have been started but for the fact that the appropriate for this purpose had become exhausted. Farmers Institutes have also received their requirements in improved sires and a number of private breeders have also been assisted in making their selections. In addition to this a number of Calf Clubs—the object of which is to improve the cattle industry have been established at various points.

Taking all prospects of the market into consideration, and the activities of the present season, with a view to effecting improvement in our dairy herds, the dairy cattle situation in the Province is one that has a most encouraging outlook. Farmers' Institutes Clubs or individual breeders, who are in need of improved dairy stock—either male or female—should get in touch with the Livestock (Livestock) Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, who will assist as far as possible in the selection and distribution of improved livestock.
