Deep belts are universally worn with the sack bolero. In fact, only a tolerably deep one is admissible, as no vest, shirt waist or blouse should show between the belt and the bolero. The pointed belts made of tinsel ribbon are very effective with a dark coat and skirt, but are not suitable for a large figure, as they call too much attention to the waist.

Coffee Coats Pretty and Becoming. Small Coats.

Lace coffee coats are very useful for home wear, but are disappointing elsewhere, as they have a loose negligee effect which is not desirable away from one's own fireside. The blouse with deep fall of lace and extensively pouched front has more style, and, if cut square, the neck is easily filled in with a chemisette when required less décolleté.

There is apparently a tendency to return to the fashion of distinct sleeves differing from the bodice. Several of the Paris models have had the diverse undersleeves so extended that the real oversleeve formed little more than an
