The London Times in referring to Canada's people says:

The latest census bulletin received from Ottawa is of considerable interest, as in it the population of Canada is classified according to birthplaces, and thus the currents of immigration can be traced. It appears that of the 4,871,051 inhabitants, about 87 per cent. or 4,271,805, were born in the Dominion. Of the remainder, 399,016 came from the British Islands, 12,431 from Newfoundland, 1,078 from India, 991 from Australia, 374 from New Zealand, 108 from South Africa, and 673 from other British possessions. It is noteworthy that the immigration from Great Britain and Ireland does not keep pace with the loss by death or emigration of Canadians born in those countries. The English born, who had increased from 169,504 in 1851 to 219,088 in 1891, only numbered 293,803 last year; while the Irish born have steadily diminished from 135,826 in 1851 to 149,184 in 1891, and 101,628 in 1901; and the Scottish born from 115,062 in 1851 to 107,584 in 1891 and 83,681 in 1901. It should perhaps be added that Wales was not included with England in the figures for 1891. In the same time the foreign-born have more than doubled having increased from 131,983 in 1851 to 157,110 in 1891 and 378,804 in 1901. The most recent total very significantly includes 127,891 natives of the United States. Russia makes a poor second with 31,226. Then follows Austria-Hungary, 28,408; Germany, 27,302; China, 17,043; Norway and Sweden, 10,258; France, 7,936; Italy, 6,832; Iceland, 6,087; Japan, 4,674; Belgium, 2,279; Denmark, 2,075; Switzerland, 1,211, and Rumania, 1,065.

Of the 127,891 born in the United States, as many as 84,493 have become naturalized as British citizens. The total number of aliens is now returned as 128,207. All immigrants of British birth are counted as Canadian citizens.

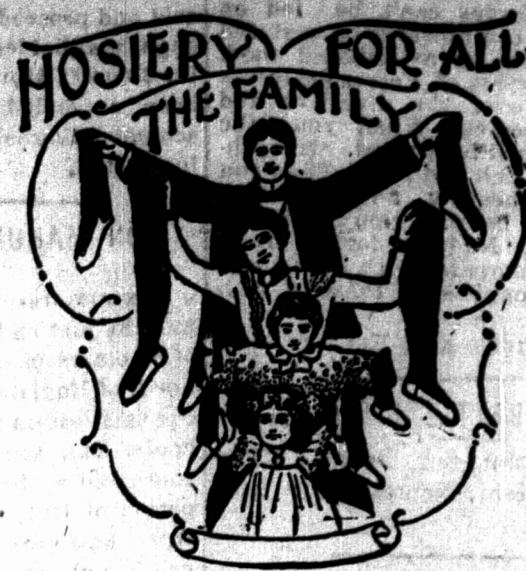
