VETERAN UMPIRE PASSES

Hank O'Day Succumbs to Illness in Chicago Hospital — Connected With Baseball For 50 Years.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, July 2.—The great umpire called a great arbiter "out" today as Hank O'Day closed his eyes in death.

Lower in a courageous battle for life, a fight destined to be lost at the start of his illness months ago, O'Day, one of baseball's greatest umpires, died in the Presbyterian Hospital of cancer and bronchial pneumonia.

The man whose eyes saw a million plays on the diamond in his 50 years connection with the game, including the never-to-be forgotten "bonehead" play of Fred Merkle, first baseman for New York Giants, that cost the Giants the National League championship in 1905, passed on peacefully.

Parmalee Breaks Losing Streak By Beating Phillies 8-4; Cards & Cubs Also Win

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 2.—After falling in his three previous starts, Roy Parmelee finally went the distance today to hang up his ninth victory of the season as New York Giants bunched eight of their 10 blows in the second to score seven runs and defeat the Phillies 8-4.

All of the seven runs crossed the plate after two were out, Mel Ott's homer with Bill Terry on base accounting for the final two tallies. The circuit drive put Ott in a tie with Jimmy Collins of the Cardinals for National League honors.

Ray Bengt, pitching a complete game for the first time since May 17, held Boston Braves to two hits as Brooklyn Dodgers won the first game of the series 5-0 at Brooklyn. Bob Brown was touched for eight blows, seven of which came in the first three innings when the Dodgers scored four of their runs.

Chicago's Cubs trounced Cincinnati Reds handily again, winning 9-3 to strengthen their hold on second place at Cincinnati.

A single, a double and Hartnett's homer drove St. Johnson from the hill before the game was many minutes old, and it was not until Hollingsworth took up the burden in the sixth that the Cubs were checked.

Meantime, Carleton held the Reds to three hits, two of them by Kampouris, until the eighth.

The world champion Cardinals climbed back into third place in the National League at St. Louis by blanking the Pittsburgh Pirates 7 to 0 in their first home stand after an unsuccessful road tour.

ENGLISH PLAYER IS ELIMINATED

Jean Hartigan of Australia Eliminates Last Year's Ladies' Champion From Wimbledon Championships.

(By Gayle Talbot, Associated Press Sports Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) WIMBLEDON, England, July 2.—Her hopes of winning her second straight Wimbledon tennis championship crashed around the ears of Dorothy Round today as she fell an unexpected victim of little Joan Hartigan of Australia in a quarter-final match.

A large crowd around the centre court looked on in amazement as Miss Round, who was seeded No. 1 and had been established a strong favorite to retain the crown, permitted Miss Hartigan with practically no backing at all to win 4-6, 6-4, 6-3. Miss Round was on top of her game, but on the best day she ever saw she would have had difficulty handling Miss Hartigan's forehand.

The Australian played was accompanied into the semi-final round, which will be played Thursday, by Helen Wills Moody and Helen Hull Jacobs of the United States and Frau Hilda Krahwinkel Sperling of Germany.

Mrs. Moody in her palmist days never displayed more devastating ground strokes than in crushing Mrs. Rene Mathieu of France, the mother of three children, 6-3, 6-0. She loosed a bewildering offensive in the second set, losing only seven points and winning three games at love.

Miss Jacobs and Frau Sperling also gained straight set triumphs but the three-times United States titleholder failed to make an impression as she permitted her burxom and erratic opponent, Mlle. Jadwiga Jedrzewska of Poland, to delay the verdict. She won by 6-1, 9-7.

Frau Sperling, who disposed of Katherine Stammers, of England, 7-5, 7-6, after overcoming a 1-5 deficit in the second set, rules a pronounced favorite over Miss Jacobs.

While the survivors of the women's division will take a day of rest tomorrow, the famous centre court will be occupied by the four semi-final matches in the men's section. The first match will bring together Fred Perry of England, the defending champion, and Jack Crawford of Australia, whom he beat for the title last year.

The other semi-finalists are Donald Budge of Oakland, Calif., and Baron Gottfried von Cramm of Germany.

CANADIAN BOXING TEAM EARNS DRAW

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 2.—Canada's crack team of amateur fighters, including two national A.A.U. champions, had a team of New York Golden Glovers to draw in their four bout preliminary to the international team match between the British and United States Golden Gloves champions here tonight.

The Canadians won victories in the 147 and 126-pound classes, but were turned back both in the 135-pound and 160-pound divisions.

Bill Marquart, Winnipeg, punched out a close decision over Ray Goss, 126 pound negro, in a three-rounder.

Gaspare Abruzzo, Manhattan school boy, evened the count, by beating Bob Carrington, Calgary printer's devil and Canadian A.A.U. lightweight champion, in another three-rounder.

Maurice Camryre, 147 pound truck driver of St. Vital, Man., and Canada's amateur welterweight king, got the decision over Pete Carrillo, Brooklyn fruit dealer, in a close-range slugfest match.

The last of the four three-round events was the only one to produce a knockout. In this Walter Franklin of London, Ont., holder of three district middleweight titles, was so badly pummeled by Eddie Steele that the fight was stopped after 2:16 of milling in the third round to give the United States negro a technical kayo.

7 STRAIGHT FOR LEAFS
