Bruins Break Own Record, Defeat N. Y. Rangers 14-3

BOSTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Boston Bruins broke their own national hockey league club scoring record as they overpowered New York Rangers, 14-3, tonight before a 12,000 crowd at the Boston Garden.

The terrific scoring, which was one shy of the Detroit Red Wings' 15-goal league scoring mark set against Rangers last season, enabled the Bruins to strengthen their grip on their fourth-place play-off berth.

The veteran Bill Cowley paced the Bruins by scoring four times. Kenney Smith performed the three-goal "hat trick" and Frankie Mario scored twice. The veteran Bill Thoms collected his first goal as a Bruin and the other tallies came off the sticks of Herb Cain, Gino Rozzini and defencemen Dit Clapper and Jack Crawford, who started his forces on their rampage by rifling home a 45-footer during the 12th minute of play.

Rangers were able to get only 18 shots on the Boston net during the one-sided action and two of the Fred Hunt team were fired by Fred Hunt and the first three frames. Ab Demarco contributed the Rangers' final marker.

SON IS BORN TO Cpl. Billy Conn

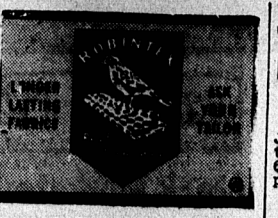
