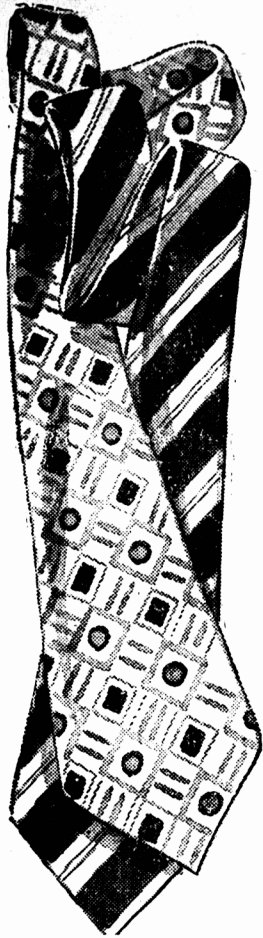


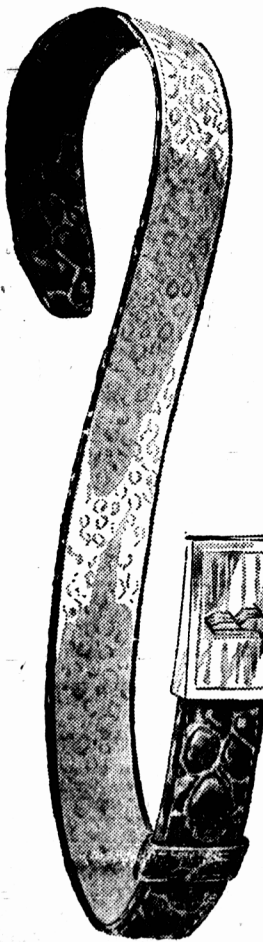

EDUCATIONAL HORIZON

ECLIPSE
The obscuring or darkening of a heavenly body by another or its shadow. An eclipse of the sun is caused by the moon passing between it and the earth; the moon is eclipsed when it passes through the earth's shadow. An eclipse is total when the whole face of the sun or moon is hidden, and partial when only a portion of the face is in darkness. When the moon leaves the outer rim of the sun exposed, the eclipse is annular. Stars and planets also suffer eclipse.

LAC
NATURE (Primary Grades)
Lac is a dark-red resin produced by action of an insect on the sap of certain trees in N. E. India. It is so named because of the infinite number of insects required for its production. Twigs covered with this substance from stick-lac; from these the resin is removed by washing, and melted to form shellac, which is used in making varnishes and is the principal ingredient of sealing-wax. Shellac is exported chiefly from Bengal. From lac a scarlet dye is also obtained. Lac or Lakh, in India, a hundred thousand.

NATURE (Primary Grades)
What berries and seeds we find birds eating in the winter and what food we provide for them. Is there anything busier on a bright sunny morning when most of the snow has left, than a bird? This is their chance for getting a little food before another storm so they have to make use of it.

1. What do we find them eating? Berries and seeds.
2. What kind of berries do they eat? Any wild berries that they can find such as those that form on the wild rose, etc.
3. What kinds of seeds do they eat? Hay seed, apple seed or fruit seeds.
4. Do they ever get food from people? Yes.
5. What kinds of foods do they get from us? Bits of bread, meat, suet.
6. Can we buy special bird food? Yes.
7. Should we feed the birds? Yes.
8. Why? Because many of them are useful. How can we train them to come for their food? By putting it in the same place each day.

During the winter it is very hard for birds to get food but they manage to pick up any waste food such as crumbs, seeds, berries, etc., along with meat and suet or possibly bird food that is given them by people.

Knowledge which is acquired under compulsion has no hold on the mind. Therefore do not use compulsion, but let early education be rather a sort of amusement; this will better enable you to find out the natural bent of the child.

THE PRODUCTION OF SWEDEN TURNIP SEED

Swedes are biennial in habit, which means that in the first year mother roots or seed roots are grown, stored over winter and in the second year are set out to produce seed.

Variety to Grow. Climatic adaptation, resistance to disease and purpose of the crops are important in selecting a particular variety to be grown for seed. In club-root infested areas, the Wilmshelmsburger or Bangholm varieties of swedes are widely grown. In areas where this disease is not prevalent, varieties such as Dittmars, Hall's Westbury, Acadia, or Laurentian have been grown with success. The latter variety is particularly well adapted for table purposes.

Growers who wish to produce seed for their own use or for commercial purposes would be well advised to secure registered, or certified seed of approved types from which to grow and select seed roots for seed production the following year.

Soil. Seed roots, which may be either nature or immature roots, may be grown successfully on almost any kind of soil that is deep, fertile and well drained and which is in good physical condition. A clay loam is preferable for a good crop of swedes.

PREPARATION OF LAND FOR SEEDING

Roots are usually grown in crop rotation following sod.

Under these conditions the sod should be ploughed shallow in the late summer, cultivated during the fall and ribbed up or re-ploughed fairly deep late in the fall. In the spring the land must be well cultivated or disked, drag harrowed, rolled and set up in ridges.

WAR DEFAULTERS ARE DENIED VOTE

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Nov. 19 — (CP) — War defaulters in New Zealand — those who refused service when conscripted and were sent to detention camps — will not be eligible to vote at New Zealand's general election on November 27. Those who, after commitment to a detention camp, ceased to be classified as defaulters through being classed as medically unfit for active service, or who later volunteered for military service, will be able to vote, but those who remained in the camps will be barred. All defaulters have been released, passengers around a wooden track, a small ferris wheel and airplane swings.

Their names were erased from the electoral rolls in 1945 and no action has so far been taken to restore them.
