ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

The Provincial Legislature will be opened by Lieutenant Governor McIntyre this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

REMEMBER the entertainment in Zion Church this evening. The program which is an excellent one appears elsewhere.

ON the 22nd inst the ladies of the Methodist church Souris presented Mrs. E. Bell with a nice sum of money on the eve of her visit to England.

A PROHIBITION summons was served yesterday on John O'Brien, Lower Hillsboro Street. This one with two others served previously, are returnable on next Wednesday.

The special votes polled at Charlottetown for the St. Peter's election were opened yesterday. There were six for McIsaac and three for Kitchham. This makes the majority for McIsaac 78.

DONALD MATHERSON of Bull River, who left home two years ago to go to the States, is now employed in Boston, Mass., U. S. A., as a motorman, Number 6206, on the surface cars of the Boston Elevated Railway, a position of considerable responsibility.

REV. GORDON DICKIE, of Little Bras d'Or, who has just been extended a call by Zion Presbyterian church, Charlottetown, is likely to get another from St. Andrew's St. John, Mr. Dickie, when seen by a St. John's Telegraph correspondent would not commit himself as to whether he would accept either call.

The employees of the N. B. & P. E. I., railway between Sackville and Tormontine are still struggling with the snow. They no sooner get the road ploughed out than another snow storm arrives and the cuttings drift full, and the work must be done all over again. This has been the program nearly all winter. At the present time there are banks of snow all along the line the equal of which were perhaps never before seen at this season. In some places they are five and six feet high, the accumulation of snow that the plow has been throwing out during the last two months. It has been the hardest winter that this railway has ever experienced.

The funeral took place at York yesterday of Peter Proud, one of the oldest residents of that section of the Province. The services were conducted by Rev. S. M. Hicks and notwithstanding the disagreeable weather there was a large attendance. The deceased was in his 80th year and up to a few months ago was hale and hearty. Since that time he has been in failing health and despite the attention of kind friends and all that medical aid could do, death claimed the victor. His kind, generous and hospitable disposition has made for him a name which will not soon be erased by time. He leaves to mourn two daughters and one son, Albert, with whom he always lived.

The people of Kensington were painfully shocked on Monday morning when it was learned that on Sunday evening about 11 o'clock little George, only son of M. F. and Mrs. Schurman had passed away. On Friday George was out playing as usual. Saturday he was taken ill with inflammation of the bowels and on Sunday evening owing to heart failure he died. George, although only six and a half years old, was a general favorite. "Such a manly little fellow" was the opinion of all. The sympathy of the whole place goes out to Mr. and Mrs. Schurman in their sudden and sore bereavement in the death of their only son. May God, "whose riches in mercy" abundantly bless and sustain them as they pass through the deep waters. The funeral which took place on Tuesday, was very largely attended. Rev. S. H. Young officiating. The pallbearers were Marshall McMahon, Hartell Simms, Edgar Moase, Alex. Anderson, Don. Darrach, Harrison Lowther. The casket was covered with beautiful flowers from loving friends, and all that was mortal of dear little George Schurman was laid to rest in the cemetery at Kensington.
