PHILIP J. FLETCHER, Berkley, Mass., died on Saturday in his 62nd year, one of the oldest residents of this town. He was born in 1843, September 12, on Prince Edward's Island and when about 20 years old struck out like many thousands of other young people from that section for the United States. He lived first in New Jersey, engaged in railroad work, then went to Rhode Island and finally to Berkley. For 25 years he was a traveling merchant through country towns, but occasionally took railway building contracts with good financial success. He then made farming and farm products his business and as a successful man in those lines has been known to the present generation. He was active in town affairs, serving as selectman and collector, was largely instrumental in building the Methodist church and active in promoting its interests. In 1871 he went to Europe, Egypt and the Holy Land, Turkey and Russia and thoroughly enjoyed the tour which had been one of the ambitions of his life. In 1885 Mr. Fletcher married Cynthia A. Greene of Rhode Island and of the union nine children were born, of whom George Fletcher of Raynham and Louis P. Fletcher of Berkley are the only survivors. For several years the infirmities of old age kept Mr. Fletcher retired from business, but during his active years he was one of the best known and efficient farmers of this section, and a valuable citizen in every way to which he devoted his attention. 
