Bearers were: Joseph McQuaid, John E. McQuaid, Michael Costello, Guy MacLeod, Peter Caragher and James Quinn.

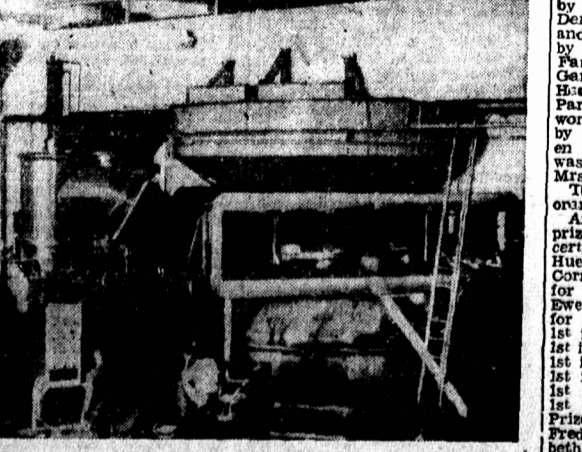

**Suttie Honoured By Netherlands**

OTTAWA, July 19 — National Defence Headquarters announced today that Brigadier E. E. Suttie, C.B.E., D.S.O., E.D. has been awarded the award of Commander, in the Netherlands Government.

The citation accompanying the award reads:

"Brigadier Suttie was in charge of the Den Helder sector of Holland during the evacuation of the 25th German Army. He was responsible for removing and searching all German prisoners across the Zuider Zee into Northern Holland. He performed his duties in a most satisfactory way and was responsible for recovering from the Germans a considerable amount of loot which was subsequently handed back to the Dutch authorities."

"By his zealous efforts and energetic action the whole of the 25th German Army was evacuated through this sector out of Holland within the period of a few weeks. This service was a contribution to the rehabilitation of Holland and is worthy of recognition by the Dutch Government."

A graduate of the Royal Military College, Brigadier Suttie was plant engineer at Yarmouth, N.S. prior to the outbreak of war in 1939. He has been serving overseas since January 1940 and is expected to return to Canada in the latter part of this month.
