The speaker contended that public examinations as we have known them had outlived their usefulness, a contention which later in the meeting was capably questioned by Mrs. F. J. DeLory, who contended that it had been the only opportunity a parent had of seeing the children in the school. It was

pointed out that a more efficient programme of furnishing school room equipment, improving toilet and drinking water facilities, providing entertainment and accelerating attendance, could be instituted by a Parent and Teacher Association. Remarks followed by Mrs. Michael Burke Sr., Mrs. F. J. DeLory, Mrs. W. W. MacLaren and Trustee, Archie Wight, all of whom expressed the need of an association and promised their co-operation. Finally after considerable discussion it was moved by Mrs. F. J. DeLory and seconded by Mrs. N. A. Wight that the present meeting be adjourned to be called at a time and place designated by the principal, meeting a Parent and Teacher Association and that some Department of Education official be in attendance.

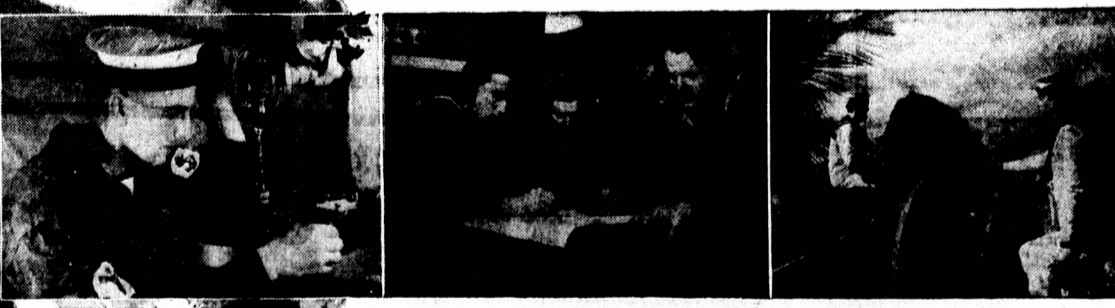
