Sunday Dec. 19th, saw the Albany Baptist church congregation happily worshipping in their recently enlarged and improved church. The services of the day were marked by three sermons, by Pastor Wm M. Field, Rev Wm Thompson, (Meth) and Rev Wm McLeod (Pres). The services were attended by a concourse of people that completely filled the edifice, leaving many unable to get seats. The opening service was led by the pastor, who delivered a sermon from 1 Thess. 1:3. The speaker wished to convey his sincere and hearty congratulations to the congregation and their friends for their grand support and also desired to publicly express his deep sense of gratitude to the committee in bringing such a great undertaking to such a splendid issue. In proceeding with his discourse he showed that the formal opening of the place of worship meant the act of setting a part forever the edifice to the honor and glory of God. A church was not simply a "meeting house" as some people could suppose, but a place where God's people could come face to face and offer God their thankful praise and worship. It was a regrettable error the idea that permeated so large a part of the Protestant church that God's people should go to church to receive something to hear and see and be entertained, instead of going for the purpose of giving something to God. The sermon was listened to with the greatest attention. The music at the three services was excellent, Mrs Freeman Boulter presiding at the organ. The interior of the church is very neat, the walls being tinted in blue and the woodwork finished in hard oil. The platform space is much greater than formerly, the table wall having been removed and several feet added so that the choir platform is immediately behind the pulpit. A new foom has been provided for the choir, with an extra entrance from the side of the church. The building committee which had charge of the operations and which has discharged its duties so faithfully are, Freeman Boulter, Geo Woods, John Lawson. The exterior which is newly shingled will be painted in the spring. The offertory plates were presented by Jas Chisolm and a beautiful set of angle Lamps by A. Lord of Albany.
