### BUSINESS MEN OF JAPAN EAGER FOR RUSSIAN TRADE

TOKIO, May 30.—Business and professional men of Japan who have been badly hit by the failure of Japan and Russia to negotiate a commercial treaty have started movements to secure another conference between representatives of the two countries. The Associated Chambers of Commerce have passed resolutions urging the resumption of relations with Russia, and, besides pressing their own government, propose sending a delegation to Moscow to carry on unofficial negotiations with the Soviet.

A plan has been formulated by a body of prominent business men, scholars, politicians and others to organize a large party to travel through Russia and observe political, economical and social conditions obtaining in that country.

Meanwhile relations between the two countries have not been improved by some recent incidents. The latest is the refusal of the Soviet to allow the Japanese council at Vladivostok to send a cable to his government in code. This step was taken because of the refusal of the Japanese government to allow Adolf Joffe, the Soviet delegate, to send code messages to his government during his visit to Japan.

SHELBY, Mont., June 1.—Jack Kearns believes implicitly in the Champ.
