NEW BATHING HOUSE.—The new bathing house for the people of the East end of the city is now assured. BACK FROM K. C. CONVENTION.—Dr. W. J. McMillan, of this city, has returned from New York where he attended the Supreme Convention of the Knights of Columbus. The only other delegate in attendance from the Maritime Provinces was Dr. Broderick of St. John, N. B. The convention was the greatest ever held in America by the Knights of Columbus. The membership has been growing by leaps and bounds and has now attained a total strength of 416,000. The principal work of the convention has been in the line of war activities dealing with recreation huts and providing comforts for the soldiers. Only three societies have official recognition for the carrying on of this work—the Y. M. C. A., the K of C., and a Jewish Association. The chairman of the War Camp Activities, Washington, was present at the convention and gave an address, praising the work of the organizations which all tended towards winning the war by making better soldiers physically and morally. Another notable address was delivered by the French Ambassador at Washington. For war camp activities the Knights of Columbus last year collected \$11,000,000. This year they propose to collect \$50,000,000. The K. C. drives in the Maritime Provinces for \$100,000 is for similar work among the Canadian soldiers and the watchword "Everybody welcome—Everybody free" applies to all denominations.

FURTHER DETAILS OF NAVY LEAGUE MEETING

branch of the Navy League, and the Sailors' Relief Fund was merged with it and \$800 was secured in a tag day canvass. When the war is over, said Mr. Pops, it is probable that the most of our soldiers will be disbanded. Let us hope that the navy will never be disbanded. Let us hear no more of England's navy, but of our navy. We have got to think imperially and our boys have got to get into that navy. The splendid address of Rev. Dr. Hall followed, a synopsis of which appeared in yesterday's issue.

Sir Louis Davies, who moved the resolution which also appeared in yesterday's Guardian, said that the people of this country always contributed cheerfully and largely to every good object, but one thing they insisted on, and that was—they must have an explanation in regard to how these funds are devoted. There are no more generous people than the people of Canada, provided their subscriptions go towards the object intended, and no other. Their contributions towards the various patriotic funds have been most generous and far beyond the most sanguine expectations. Sir Louis paid a tribute to the worthiness of the Navy League and the Sailors' Relief Fund, and expressed the hope that when the call was made for funds for the care of the widows and orphans of the sailors who have done so much towards bringing ultimate victory in this war that the people would open their hearts and their pockets and give freely of their means. Mayor Wright in seconding the resolution, referred to, also paid a tribute to the cause so eloquently pleaded by Rev. Dr. Hall, and said that patriotism without sacrifice was a "sounding brass and tinkling symbol." If we gave in proportion to the sacrifices that have been made by the brave men on the sea we would not be found wanting.

Mr. J. O. Hyndman, secretary of the local organization, also spoke briefly referring to what had been done in the past, and hoped that a generous response would be made when the time came. He said that the services of the members of the local executive were being offered gratis. He heartily thanked Dr. Hall for his presence, the Daughters of the Empire, Mr. Gallagher for the use of the hall, the Boy Scouts for their assistance, Mr. Charles Earle for his pleasing solo, and the 4th Regiment Band for music supplied at the opening of the meeting.

After singing the chorus of Rule Britannia and God Save the King, the meeting closed.

CAUSE OF RAILWAY STRIKE AT KIEV

AMSTERDAM, August 10.—Inquiry at Kiev has proved that the railway strike there was the result of foreign influences and directed against the Ukrainian Government and the Central Powers, according to the Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung. Several enemy agents from Great Russia, who are under arrest, the newspaper says, belong to a secret organization which is well financed. One of the manifestos of this organization reads:

"The enemy is despoiling us and stealing our bread in order to continue fighting. All this delays the revolution in the West. 'Comrades, we have put up with the Kaiser's dogs long enough. Cease railway traffic and thereby help thousands of armed peasants to overrun the towns at a given moment.' A newspaper says that workmen made an unsuccessful attempt on the life of M. Britenko, the Railway Minister, and warned other high officials that they had been sentenced to death by the strike committee. Several persons have been arrested by the authorities and executed. It is stated that the strike is now abating.
