In Memoriam

MR. LEWIS SPENCE

The death of Mr. Lewis Spence, Bedeque, age 92 occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Earle W. Sawler, Cape Traverse, where he had gone just one week previous. He had just returned from the Prince County Hospital where he had been treated for pneumonia and only remained at his own home a few days when he took a cold and was taken to the Cape Traverse, where Mrs. Sawler tenderly nursed him until the time of his death.

He was a life long resident of Bedeque where he farmed the greater part of his life and in his retirement, he bought a home in Centerville, where he and his wife spent the last years of their life. He was married to Miss Hannah Clark who predeceased him several years ago. At the time of his death he was the oldest Orangeman in the Province, he had been a member for 74 years and even at his advanced age he was a regular attendant at his Lodge meetings during the past Summer. He advanced to the highest degrees of the Order, being a member of the Royal Black Knights of Ireland, and had attained the Red Cross Degree.

On his 90th birthday the Grand Master of the Orange Order for the province held a special meeting for the occasion and presenting him with an Honorary Certificate from the Most Worshipful Grand Orange Lodge of British America. In politics he was a

strong supporter of the Conservative party, he was upright and honest and was highly respected by all the community.

His funeral was held on Monday, Feb. 19th, and was conducted by Rev. J. M. Baxter, assisted by Rev. H. J. Bishop and a large number of the Bedeque joined with the Cape Traverse choir in singing. The text was 1st. John, 2nd. Chap. 17th verses. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof; but he that doeth the will of God abideth forever. Hymns sung were: Unto The Hills, The Lord's My Shepherd, and Safe In The Arms Of Jesus. The Royal Black Knights of Ireland conducted their funeral service at the house with Sir Knight Verner Moore, W. P. in charge, and Sir Knight Stewart Inman acting as Chaplain, closing their service by singing Abide With Me.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Lewis Muttart, Fred Irving, Lloyd Affleck, T. J. Inman, Stewart Inman and Cyril McFarlane. The burial arrangements were under the supervision of Heath Chisholm, Funeral Director. Interment in Searletown cemetery.—B.

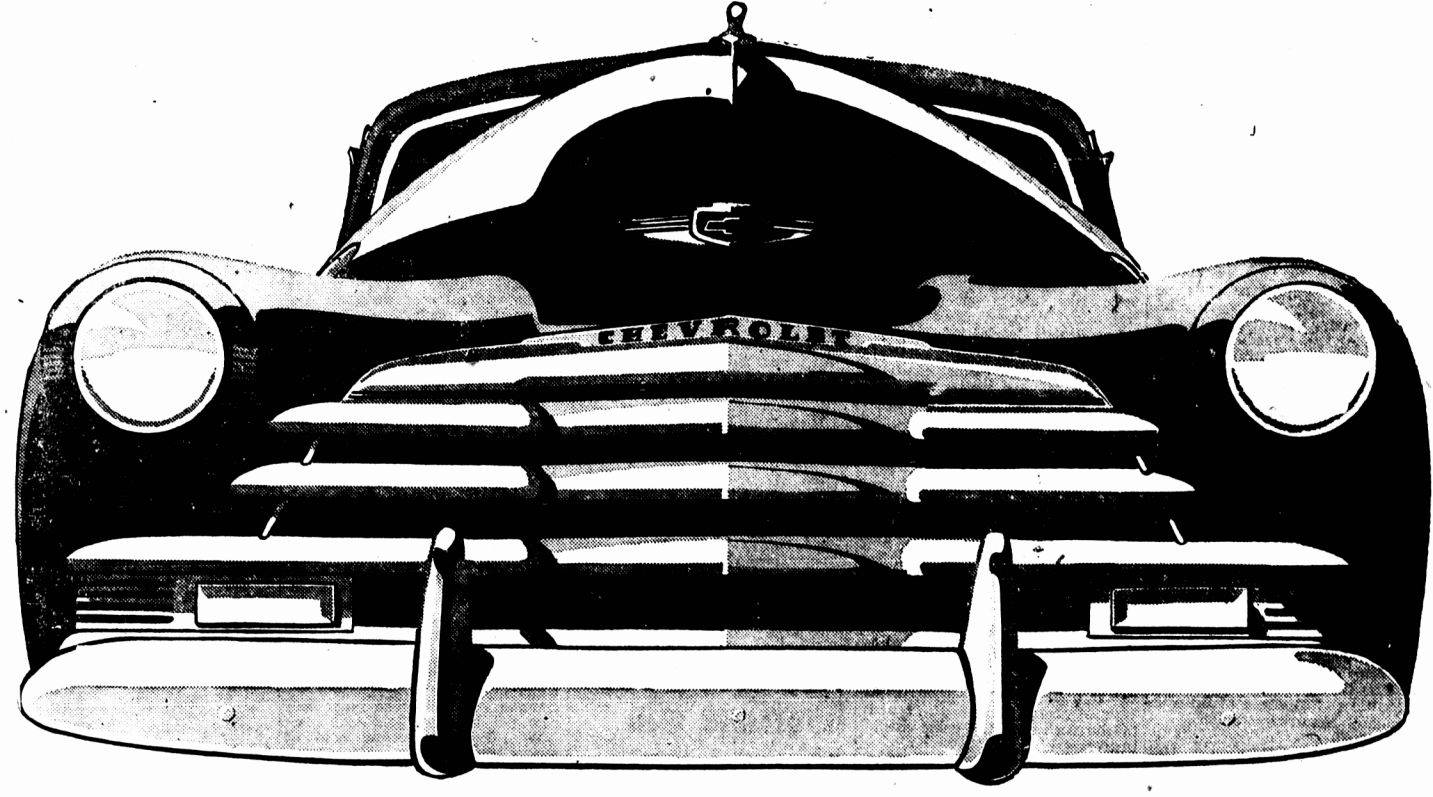
