### IRISH HOME RULE

Notwithstanding the fiery speech of Sir Edward Carson at the Women's Tariff Reform and Unionist Association, London, the Ulster problem is essentially one for compromise. Students of Irish history fully recognize the futility of expecting any immediate final settlement along party or religious lines. We have got to bear in mind that some portion of Ireland has been suffering injustice at the hands of England since twelfth century; and that ever since 1160 the English colonists in Ireland have been oppressed and driven to throw in their lot with their Irish brethren. The first settlement of Ireland was by Catholic Englishmen who became the dominating power seven centuries ago. English oppression alienated their sympathies for the Motherland and they became more discontented and dissatisfied with the English Government than the Irish peasantry. The wholesale massacre of Ormond leaders by the English Government put a period to agitation in the seventeenth century, but for a time only. Again and again the domiciled Irishmen disputed English authority or domination, and it is the same spirit which animates the Ulstermen of today. Ireland has been described as the land of unrest and emotionalism. The unrest, at all events, has not been due to the original Irish stock but to the English blood introduced in the interests of English domination. The history of Irish dissatisfaction coincides with the colonizing of Ireland. Many of the bitterest malcontents have been of English descent, for the early colonizers freely intermarried with the Irish, and were more keen to resent English interferences than the pure stock itself. The English first attempted to rule Ireland through the chiefs of the Septs marrying them to the daughters of English colonists, and when these got too powerful they were summarily deposed, executed or exiled and English magnates substituted. Time only rung the changes, and instead of English administration proving beneficial it tended to develop the land system and absentee landlordism which reached a crisis in the seventies and eighties of last century. In the nineties progressive land legislation and land purchase schemes did much to alleviate conditions, and at the present time the lot of the Irish agriculturist is better than ever it has been, and better than that of the English or Scottish agriculturist.

But the long oppression has left its imprint, and the demand for a measure of self-government in the south and west has not lessened to any appreciable extent. A parliament in Dublin is the ideal and ambition of all patriotic Irishmen in three-fourths of the Green Isle. The only obstacle to its realization is the strenuous opposition of the Ulster Protestant Irishmen who are as vigorously antagonistic to the restoration of the Irish parliament as they were opposed to its abolition prior to 1801. An impartial reviewer need not concern himself with the superficial reasons given for this

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opposition today. The fact remains that these northern Irish are constitutionally "agin the Government" of England whenever, or for whatever reason, it seeks to interfere with the status quo.

Leading English statesmen are beginning to recognize this and that a settlement of the Irish question is not to be secured by coercion of either the north or the south. To do so must necessarily mean civil war, a contingency repugnant to every one whatever his creed or politics. This feeling found expression in the recent debate in the British parliament which resulted in the resumption of the "conversations" between the contending leaders.

The plea for peace was introduced by Mr. Winston Churchill. "Today I believe most firmly," he said, "that peace with honor is not beyond the reach of all. Tomorrow it may be gone forever. I am going to run some little risk on my own account by what I now say. Why cannot the hon. gentleman (Sir Edward Carson) say boldly, Give me the amendments to this Home Rule Bill which I ask for to safeguard the dignity and the interests of Protestant Ulster, and I in return will use all my influence and good will to make Ireland an integral unit in a federal system. If the right hon. gentleman used language of that kind in the spirit of sincerity which everybody will instantly credit from him, it would go far to transform the political situation."

This unexpected peroration was met in the friendliest spirit. Mr. Balfour considered it contained the germ of "potency and promise of a settlement which would avoid this final and irreparable catastrophe of civil war." He considered that were civil war inevitable it would be to him "a mark of the failure of a life's work. It is the admission that causes for which I have most striven which I have most earnestly sought accomplished, are fated to break down." These are the words of the one man now in the House of Commons who has devoted the greater part of his political career in endeavoring to solve the Irish question.

Sir Edward Carson undertook to press in Ulster the acceptance of any proposal which clearly provided (1) that Ulster should be excluded, (2) that Ulster should later be brought into a federal scheme only if, in the meantime, the Irish Parliament in Dublin won her friendship and confidence.

Mr. Asquith replying to this concession on the part of Sir Edward Carson said: "I think it was a speech which was intended to help and not hinder a settlement. That spirit we entirely reciprocate."

Everyone then waited upon a pronouncement by Mr. Redmond in order to find the length he would be prepared to go to bring about a settlement. He did not keep the public long in suspense. It was futile, to expect the Nationalists to accept any measure of Home Rule that excluded Ulster. "United Ireland" would, in such circumstances, be a misnomer, and executive Home Rule practically impossible. Thus the outcome of the "conversations" has not been so satisfactory as the optimists would have liked, but in view of their significant importance attaches to the changed attitude of the British Weekly the great Non-conformist organ, of which Sir W. Robertson Nichol is editor, and the London Star, the only Radical London evening paper, both of which have since the debate expressed the opinion that Ulster must be excluded indefinitely from the Home Rule Bill. Should Mr. Redmond and Mr. Develin ultimately consent to this, a way out of the present impasse would be obtained, and not many years would elapse before an internal agitation would gain strength in Ulster to claim that admission to the Irish Parliament which she now rejects.

To get the contending parties to realize that this policy is the only alternative to civil war is the difficulty.

### THE EGG CIRCLE MOVEMENT

Sir,—May I ask for space in your valuable paper to say a few words to all members of the Prince Edward Island Egg Circles. It has been decided apparently by the wholesale egg buyers in this Province and at least one leading firm in Montreal to pay the same price for store eggs as circle eggs. It is true that they quote one cent per dozen more for circle eggs than for store eggs, but when they have paid the storekeepers their commission either in cash or in some other way, or the peddler his commission, they will be paying the same for all eggs, and of course the egg circles have to pay their managers just as the wholesale buyers have to pay store-keepers and peddlers. The buyers may have found that eggs were too high in price but the education which is being disseminated in the Dominion should have been encouraged by a difference in the prices.

This is a brilliant illustration for farmers of what solid co-operation can do and it also illustrates that the middle men are dictators to the
