THE mail train arrived last night at 10.45.

A BETTER demand for flour is reported, with a steadier market in the west.

THERE is good mackerel fishing at Tracadie. Acadia Hotel boats took 80 with the hook yesterday.

DR and Mrs Prowse, of Edinburgh, are visiting Murray Harbor. Dr Prowse is a son of Senator Prowse.

MR ALEX McDONALD, Mrs McDonald and servants arrived yesterday evening, and will spend the summer at their summer residence in Tracadie.

SS CITY OF GHENT arrived here last evening about 5.30 with a general cargo of freight and four passengers. She returns this morning at 10 o'clock.

MISS RAMSAY, daughter of Rev E Ramsay of Bayfield, will have charge of the intermediate department in Central School next term, vice Miss Bessie Young, resigned.—Sackville Post.

THOMAS J DILLON, the well known cheese and butter dealer of St John, N B, and Charlottetown, P E I, is in Sussex today. He is shipping large quantities of cheese from there to London, England.—St John Sun.

At the public meeting in connection with the Grand lodge meeting at Eldon, Judge Chase and Rev D E McLeod, gave addresses which are very highly spoken of. While at Eldon Judge Chase was the guest of Mr Moore.

THE contract for supplying the new boiler and engine for the pumping station has been awarded to Mr T A McLean, of Charlottetown. The contract is to be completed by the 15th of September. The tender for brick has been awarded to Carvell Bros. The grey stone is to be supplied by Geo Battye, Wallace, and the hard stone by J F Robertson, Charlottetown.

CARDIGAN NOTES.—Sebr Mary E, owned by Morson and McCormack, and commanded by Capt M H Bonnell, arrived at this port on July 9th. Capt Bonnell sailed from this port two weeks ago laden with cattle and produce. He retained the cargo at St Pierre. Miq returned to Marble Mountain and loaded lime stone for this port, being his fifth cargo since April 28th in the St Pierre trade.

DR ROBERT GRIERSON, of this city, Rev Mr F... of Grafton, Kings, and Rev Mr M R... of Baddeck, leave on Saturday morning en route for the Korean missionary field. They will sail from Vancouver. Dr Grierson, who is well known in Charlottetown, will be accompanied by his bride, Miss Veinot, the marriage ceremony to be performed by Rev John MacMillan on Saturday morning.—Halifax Herald.

French Sympathy.

PARIS, July 9.—Emperor William of Germany has telegraphed to President Faure from Oslo, Norway, expressing his sympathy with the families who have been plunged into mourning by the loss of La Bourgogne. The Russian Ambassador has called personally upon President Faure to offer his condolences.

The Cabinet has discussed the disaster, the cause of the almost immediate sinking of the vessel, the number of the saved and what assistance could be accorded by the Government to the survivors.

The municipality of Havre has started a fund for the relief of the families of the members of the crew who were drowned.

M. Francois Deloncle, brother of the captain of La Bourgogne, does not credit the report that the only survivors of the lost vessel were those towed in by the Grecian. He believes that some of the passengers and crew reached other steamers.

M. Dechanel, president of the Chamber of Deputies, and Premier Brisson have sent expressions of sympathy to the French and foreign families who are mourning the loss of friends and relatives in the disaster to La Bourgogne, and have also expressed their admiration of the conduct of the officers of the lost boat. The Chamber passed a vote expressing the sympathy of the country.

The Gauslois published a report of an interview with a prominent naval officer, who says that despite the efforts of the Marine Department and the Chamber of Commerce to have the French passenger ship kept well off the banks of Newfoundland Compagnie Generale Trans-atlantique has hitherto persistently refused to change the course of its vessels.

There has been a revival of the discussion of the dangers to which ships are subjected in passing the banks of Newfoundland, and the agitation begun by Commander Riondel of Havre to secure an international agreement that all ships shall keep away from the banks has been started again.

NOTES AND NEWS.

Nearly 6,000 cheese were offered on the wharves at Montreal on Monday morning, and all were sold at prices ranging from 64c to 7c, subject to warehouse inspection. The price last week was from 7c to 7 1/2c. The market is fairly steady, but the Liverpool cable stands at 35s, a further fall of 6d. Sales on Ontario boards are at 7 to 7 1/2c.

The prospect of an abundant hay crop this season has had a rather disastrous effect upon the local hay market. Hay has gone away down in price and there is no telling when it will go up again. A Mauderville farmer, who raises a large quantity of hay, demurred a few weeks ago when offered \$11 for a ton by a citizen, now he is willing to sell out for \$6. There seems to be plenty of old hay, which the owners find difficulty in disposing of at \$6.—Fredericton Herald.
