A very large congregation filled the Kirk of St. James yesterday, when friends from all parts of the Island met to pay a final tribute to the late Rev. Thomas W. Goodwill who died as the result of a heart attack in the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Oct. 12 at the age of 76.

Under the auspices of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, the service was conducted by the Rev. James A. McGowan of Kensington, assisted by the minister of the Kirk, Rev. T. H. Bussell Somers. In his address, Rev. Donald Nicholson of Brookfield referred in moving terms to the qualities of the late Mr. Goodwill as a pastor, teacher, preacher and friend.

Among the mourners were his widow and daughter, Edna, from Toronto and his son Victor Goodwill.
