CHEERING NEWS FOR CANADIAN READERS

Exports of Automobile Products Show Improvement, While Lumber Exports For Fiscal Year Are Up.

(Special to the Guardian)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 17.—Cheering news for Canadian readers is contained in the weekly report of the Department of Commerce. On information from the Dominion, the department notes that Canadian exports of automobile products show slight improvement, while Canadian lumber exports for the fiscal year are up. A report to the Department from Ottawa says that although most industries report continued depression, a general improvement is noted in wholesale and retail trade in seasonal lines. Automobile exports from Canada, for which New Zealand and South Africa are the best markets, increased in September 15 percent over those for August.

MEDELLIN, Colombia, Nov. 17.—A laboratory error was alleged today to have caused the death of sixteen children and made thirty-three others critically ill, with little hope for recovery. Authorities said a doctor at the Casas Cunas Free Institute had inoculated the children with diphtheria germs in mistake for anti-diphtheria vaccine; a group of forty-nine children were given free treatment at the clinic and had already received two anti-diphtheria inoculations. In making the third inoculation, a mix-up occurred in the package containing the serum, and instead of the vaccine, it contained deadly diphtheria virus being kept for experimentation. The mistake was discovered after eight of the children died. Eight more died later. The families of the dead children, maddened by their grief, stormed the clinic and police were forced to intervene to protect the doctors. Among the victims were three boys of one family, all under five years of age.

TARDY INQUEST AND REBURIAL IS PROMISED

Coroner's Jury To Be Empanelled In Case of Skeleton Found At East Point.

A full inquest by a Coroner's jury into the matter of the discovery of a skeleton at East Point on October 20th will be held in about a week's time, when the remains will be disinterred and, after examination, properly buried. In the meantime the provincial police are investigating the matter, and have ascertained pretty definitely that the skeleton is that of the unfortunate patient who escaped from Falconwood Hospital on May 9, 1928. This is the substance of a statement to The Guardian by the Attorney General, when interviewed yesterday on the subject.

MARITIMES WILL BE HEARD AT SITTINGS

Every Facility For Expression of Opinion Will Be Given Re Freight Reduction.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Nov. 17.—Every facility for expression of opinion will be given by the Department of Railway Commissioners for Canada to Maritime Province interests in opposing the application of Quebec to be included in the 20 per cent freight reduction area. It was said in a telegram from Hon. H. A. McKeown, chairman of the Board to F. M. Sclanders, Commissioner of the St. John Board of Trade.
It is the intention of the railway board to hold sittings in the Maritime Provinces on this matter, probably two in New Brunswick and two in Nova Scotia. The hearing on the application of Quebec opens tomorrow at that city, at which the Maritimes will be represented by C. F. Inches, K.C. of St. John.

Did Not Know The Civil War Was Ended

BATON ROUGE, La., Nov. 17.—Bare-footed as he stood in United States District Court here, John Schexnayder, 82-year-old backwoodsman, told Judge Wayne Borah he has been making whiskey for fifty years and had never heard of the prohibition law.
Schexnayder, who speaks only French, pleaded guilty through an interpreter.
Among other things, the backwoodsman said he had not been told the war between the States had ended.

Reduction In The Price Of Bread

Announcement of the consent of local bakers to reduce the price of bread by one cent a pound beginning today was announced at the special meeting of the City Council last evening. The price of bread is thus now eleven cents a pound. Councillor Holman, who was chairman of the special committee appointed to interview the bakers stated that the committee went into the matter very carefully. The bakers in explaining their situation stated that the price of flour has not decreased to the same extent as has the price of wheat. The price of flour has decreased only one dollar in the last year. There will be a further later reduction Councillor Holman stated, if the price of flour is further reduced.

British Govt. Supports Scheme To Help Jews

LONDON, Nov. 17.—A big new development scheme for Palestine involving the expenditure of \$12,500,000 was announced by Drummond Shields, Under Secretary for Colonies, in the House of Commons today. The scheme is supported by the British Government, assisted by a loan and is intended to provide settlement for Jews and Arabs on land of approximately 10,000 families. The announcement, which was unexpected came in the midst of debate in which the white paper setting forth the Government's policy concerning Palestine had been vigorously attacked on the grounds of injustice to the Jews.

Well Received By Chinese

SHANGHAI, China, Nov. 17.—The trade delegation to the Orient of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce has been richly entertained since its arrival here Sunday. The North China News gave a newspaper welcome by issuing a special Canadian supplement containing a twenty page section. A committee of nine persons representing the Chinese Republic, the City of Shanghai, the local Chamber of Commerce and the British Embassy received the delegates on arrival. L. M. Cosgrave, Canadian Commissioner, was also present.

Further Lists Of Expenditures On Public Works

\$166,000 To Be Spent On P.E. Island—Much Work To Be Done In Three Counties.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 17.—Further lists of expenditures on public works for unemployment relief have been approved by Senator G. D. Robertson, Minister of Labor. The lists issued tonight bring the total amounts approved up to \$44,629,847. This includes the \$11,514,000 undertaken by the Canadian Pacific, and the \$11,765,498 by the Canadian National Railways.
Tonight's lists provide for an expenditure of \$144,000 in Prince Edward Island; \$3,501,800 in Quebec; \$683,436 in Ontario; \$125,000 in Manitoba; \$95,100 in Saskatchewan, and \$2,657,336 in Alberta. The total expenditures by provinces so far approved are: Nova Scotia, \$109,100; P. E. I., \$144,000; New Brunswick, \$400,300; Quebec, \$3,511,800; Ontario, \$1,785,100; Manitoba, \$471,190; Saskatchewan, \$1,476,841; Alberta, \$2,657,336; British Columbia, \$1,325,482; Yukon, \$5,000.

Nine Killed On Level Crossing

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 17.—Nine persons were killed at Butterworth Crossing, near DeWitt, Va., tonight when an automobile in which they were riding was struck by a Seaboard Airline passenger train. They were J. C. Flippen, white, of Clarksville, Va., and eight negroes—four women and four children.

PREM. BENNETT WELCOMED TO IRELAND

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Nov. 17.—"We feel deeply honored that the Prime Minister of Canada has found it possible to visit our country, for Canada in many respects, occupies a unique position in our thoughts and esteem," said President William Cosgrave at the luncheon given by the Free State Government today to Right Hon. R. B. Bennett. Mr. Bennett testified that the Dominion had watched with great interest the rapid progress of the Irish Free State and was warm in admiration of the manner in which the Irish had surmounted many of their difficulties.

Herbert Clow In Serious Condition At Hospital. Claud McInnis, His Companion, Held As Witness. Both Men Said To Have Been Helplessly Intoxicated.

Receiving severe injuries to the head in some unknown manner while driving along the road at Bradalbane in a light express wagon Saturday evening, Herbert Clow, 19, of Rose Valley is in the Prince County Hospital in a serious condition. Claud McInnis, 18, also of Rose Valley, is in Queens County Jail, held as a material witness pending further investigation. Both men, according to information given the police, were intoxicated when found.
Clow was found on the road at 9 o'clock on Saturday evening in an unconscious condition, his skull fractured at the base and two large cuts on his head. Mr. Hedley Woodside, and Mr. George Dixon, who found him phoned for Dr. Matheson of Rose Valley who ordered that the injured man be removed to the hospital. Clow has not yet regained consciousness, but doctors have hopes for his recovery.

TIMES SAYS BENNETT GREAT STATESMAN

British Daily Lauds Canadian Premier For Fine Work At Conference.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—In an editorial on the impressions left by the leading delegates to the recent Imperial Conference, the Times today declared that Premier R. B. Bennett of Canada, by common consent, steadily grew in stature as the weeks went by. "He set the ball rolling at the outset, even if his debut was thought at the time to be a trifle too dramatic, and perhaps, also a trifle immature," said the Times. "By the end of the Conference he had established a great reputation as a statesman of real power, of practical business experience and with a capacity for expression."

No Decision Yet In Maritime Air Mail Schedules

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 17.—No decision has yet been reached on proposed changes of maritime air mail schedules, according to officials of the post office department. A survey is being conducted, it was stated, to find the best means to improve the service between Montreal and the Atlantic seaboard, but no definite plan has yet been evolved.
Although a definite announcement could not be obtained from the Department, it is understood there is no intention to cut out the air mail service to St. John. Present indications are that the Department officials are trying to work out a triangular daylight service to include St. John, Moncton and Halifax and at the same time, speed up service from the Maritimes into Montreal.

Conference On Agriculture Opens Today At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—Two cabinet ministers will return from the Imperial conference the last of this week. Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Justice, and Hon. C. H. Cahoon, Secretary of State, Hon. Maurice Dupre, Solicitor General, will follow later. Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce, is expected to visit Canadian Trade Commissioners in Europe before he returns. Premier R. B. Bennett will probably be back early in December.
The conference on agriculture which opens today in Ottawa will doubtless be followed by other conferences between the Dominion and Provincial officials before the new year. Western provincial premiers will be here this week to discuss with the government guaranteed rates for wheat. The question of development of the St. Lawrence deep waterways is expected to necessitate further conferences with the provinces.
"We are a Dominion now," said Mr. Thomas tonight. "I would like to emphasize that point." The Secretary declared the Imperial Conference, in his view, would mark a tremendous step forward in the progress of co-öperative partnership within the Empire.
