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GERMANY'S REPLY TO AMERICAN NOTE

Likely to be Delivered Thursday. Whether War or Peace with United States will Depend on President Wilson's Reply.

(Special to the Guardian.) BERLIN, May 3.—The German reply to the American note on submarine warfare may be expected momentarily. It now appears, however, that Thursday may be the day on which it will be handed to the American Embassy.

THE IRISH REBELLION AND SOME OF ITS HARVEST

Three Rebels Court-martialed and Shot. 1,200 Rebels in Galway Shelled by Naval Vessel and Compelled to Retire. 300 Prisoners, Among Them 20 Wounded, Landed in Holyhead.

DUBLIN, via London, May 3.—The situation in Galway resulting from the Irish revolt has been serious, according to advices just received. On Tuesday, April 25, 1,200 rebels, approaching from Oranmore, were within three miles of Galway, when a naval vessel shelled them from Galway Bay, compelling them to retire to Mizard Castle at Athenry.

HOLYHEAD, WALES, via London, May 3.—Three hundred prisoners from Ireland were landed here today. The prisoners included a considerable number of persons evidently of somewhat higher station than those landed two days ago. Some of them were intellectuals who, heretofore, have been

identified mainly with the Irish literary movement. Others were clerks, sportsmen, tradesmen, or farmers. Most of them, appeared to be greatly exhausted. Although all the prisoners wore men's clothing, it was reported that several were women, thirty or forty of whom have been made prisoners.

LONDON, May 3.—An official list of casualties among the army officers at Dublin given out contains twenty. Of this total five were killed, twenty-one wounded and one missing. This list is additional to the one announced Friday giving the names of two officers killed and five wounded.

House Prorogues This Afternoon

Great progress was made in the House yesterday after the all night sitting of Tuesday. The House which adjourned at 7 a. m., resumed at 3.35. Two hours were spent considering the journals, and afterwards, a great number of bills were passed through their various stages. The House sat till 2.50 this morning and practically cleared up all the remaining legislation.

Another Air Raid On British Coast

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, May 3.—Five hostile airships attacked the northeast coast of England and the southeast coast of Scotland last night. The official announcement on the raid says that the movements of the raiders appeared uncoordinated.

FRENCH TROOPS WON BRILLIANT VICTORY

Captured German Positions in Verdun Section After Brilliant Attack, Taking 100 Prisoners and Four Machine Guns.

(Special to the Guardian.) PARIS, May 3.—An official communication issued by the war office tonight, says west of the Meuse there was a violent bombardment in the sector of Avocourt. Towards the end of the afternoon our troops by a brilliant assault captured German positions north-west of Le Morte Homme. We took about a hundred prisoners and four

machine guns. On the rest of the front artillery activity was intermittent. A Belgian official communication reads: Artillery duels continued all night in the region of Dixmude and were resumed with violence this morning. The bombardment lost its intensity this afternoon. There is nothing to report on the rest of the front.

MEN FROM HALIFAX TRANSFERRED TO 105TH

Some Points About the Musketry, Training, Guard of Honor at Closing of Legislature Soldiers Soon to Go Farming.

They arrived in Charlottetown on the 2nd. Others added to the strength recently are: Robert Wakeling, Charlottetown, Ernest Rockwell, Ocean View, Merril Hayward, Howland, Raymond G. Acorn, Charlottetown.

Private McPherson of "B" Co. has been appointed to the rank of Lance Corporal. The Guard of Honor at the Legislature today will be composed of 100 N. C. O.'s, and men of the 105th Battalion under the command of Capt. W. C. Cook, and Lieut. J. C. Tannahill and P. B. McLaine. The Guard of Honor will be accompanied by the Regimental Band.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES FOR \$28,282,081 VOTED

(From Our Own Correspondent.) OTTAWA, May 3.—The supplementary estimates tabled today call for 282,081 of which \$25,165,098 are chargeable to consolidated fund and \$3,116,983 to capital. Among the items are a number arising out of projects of the Government for increasing production and out of legislation of the present session.

Compulsion Bill Passes First Reading

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, May 3.—The Government's military bill for immediate general conscription passed its first reading in the House of Commons today. Its passage was loudly cheered.

GERMANY ACCEPTS BRITISH PROPOSALS

LONDON, May 3.—The foreign office announces that it has learned from Walter Hines Page, the American Ambassador, that Germany has accepted the British proposals for the transfer of Switzerland of British and German wounded or invalid prisoners of war for exchange.

ONTARIO COMPANY INTERESTED IN P.E.I. TRAMWAY PROPOSITION

White Mayor Brown was absent from Charlottetown some time ago visiting Ontario he interested himself in the subject of electric tramway and incidentally interviewed the management of a leading Electrical Traction Company on the question of inquiring into the possibilities of a tramway service in Prince Edward Island.
