Impressive Ceremony For Student Nurses

At an impressive "capping and candle lighting" ceremony held at the Cundall Home last evening, thirteen preliminary student nurses of the Prince Edward Island Hospital received their caps and took the Florence Nightingale Pledge, after completing successfully four months of probationary training, to become full fledged student nurses.

The ceremony, which was largely attended by relatives and friends of the student nurses, was presided over by Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy, chairman of the Board of Trustees for the Prince Edward Island Hospital. A piano prelude was given by Miss Kaye MacEachern.

Following the opening of the ceremony by the singing of O Canada, invocation was pronounced by the Rev. William T. Mercer of Mount Stewart, which was followed by the singing of the hymn "Love Divine, all Love Excelling".

Mr. Justice Tweedy congratulated the student nurses upon having reached the first step in the goal of their ambition. He spoke of the close relationship between the nursing profession and the church, and related how, in 1879, Bishop MacIntyre had asked the Bishop of Quebec for enough Sisters of Charity to take care of a hospital of 12 beds at Charlottetown.

The speaker made reference to an outstanding nurse associated with the early days of the hospital, Miss Sarah Jean Arthur, who was inspired to take up nursing as a profession after reading an editorial in "The Guardian" in 1880 regarding the need for a higher type and of superior education, to take up the care of the sick in the new hospital at Charlottetown.

He also recalled that the first training school for nurses was established in Prince Edward Island in 1880 by Miss Jessie M. Sheraton.

Fewer Imports During January Via Car Ferry

Imports via the Tormentine-Borden car ferry route for last month were approximately 96 per cent of those for January, 1947, a statement released from the Office of the Superintendent, Island Division, Canadian National Railways, reveals. Nine hundred and eighty-five carloads of various commodities were ferried last month as compared to 1,297 for the corresponding month in 1947.

Bank Statement

OTTAWA, Feb. 12 (CP)—Dominion Government deposits increased \$20,985,000 to \$123,627,000 in the week ended Feb. 11, the Bank of Canada reported today. Notes in circulation decreased \$1,188,000 to \$1,157,944,000 while deposits by chartered banks dropped \$27,607,000 to \$505,624,000.
