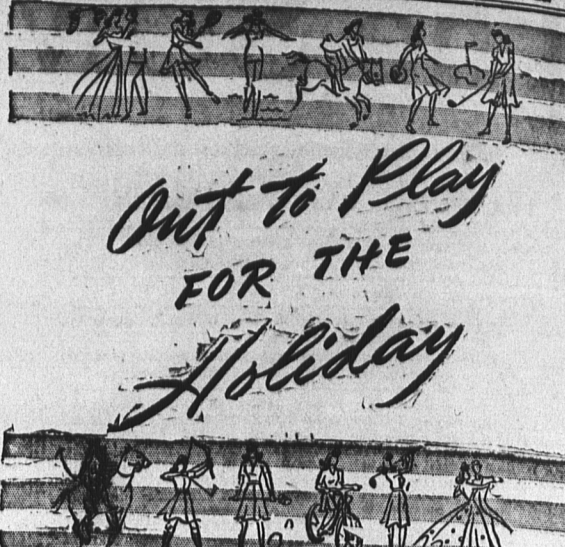
Scout News and Notices Lord Lovat, leader of the Com-mando raid on Boulogne, is President of the Scout Association of Inverness.

Suppose you were asked to name that section of the population in your country which is best prepared mentally and morally for the duties of citizenship in these days of trial, of what would be your answer? For ourselves, we would single out the Boy Scouts past and present.

A grim and unusual assignment undertaken by Quamichan, B.C., Boy Scouts was the maintenance of a night-long guard over a burning cabin containing the remains of an old Indian woman. The boys, called from a Scout meeting by the blaze, had fought the fire with buckets but it proved beyond such control. The night watch was requested, pending police examination in the morning.

A \$500 scholarship in memory of Sgt. Pilot Niall Burnett, a student of Presbyterian Theological College, Montreal has been provided by funds left by him.
