2. Church Sacraments. Rev. O. G. Wright, leader. 3. Inter-Church Co-operation. The findings of the above group were as follows: "Agreed that the young people's unions are not achieving their purpose due mainly to the smaller membership. This smaller membership was the result of war conditions. It was suggested that the different denominations group together to help solve their problems and increase their membership. In such co-operation each member of the Young People's Union will retain his own Assisted, Mrs. Cecil Maye, Mrs. Hibbert Hughes.

A prize was presented to Mrs. Leith McKinnon for knitting most articles during year. Mrs. George Bearisto and Mrs. Hibbert Hughes received honorable mention.

The receipts for year amounted to \$147.73, and Expenditures were \$127.82.

The following sums were donated: Cigarettes for Covehead Boys Overseas \$6.00; Russian Fund \$10; Milk for Britain \$5; Queens C. Fund \$5; Red Cross Campaign \$35; Greek Relief Fund \$20; Chinese Fund \$10; Sanitorium \$10.

Following work was completed: 14 quilts, 65 knitted articles, 44 articles of sewing.

Collection was taken amounting to \$3.07.

Refreshments were served by hostess and meeting closed with National Anthem.

**Salvage Campaign Still In Progress**

Notwithstanding the immense amount of salvaged materials such as rubbers, papers, metals, rags, etc., collected and disposed of by the schools and the various salvage committees throughout the province last year, there are still large quantities being gathered.

At the beginning of this year it was intimated by the Director of the National Salvage Campaign, Ottawa, that waste paper would not be required for a period of time at least consequently Prince Edward Island had not done anything to-

wards collecting paper this season. A call came however for the salvaging of rendered fats and in response to this entreaty, the butchers and meat packers of the Province were contacted and enlisted to assemble and pack this much needed material. The housewives were appealed to through various channels, to save waste fats and turn it in to their butcher.

The response has been more or less gratifying, to date approximately 60,000 lbs. of rendered fat has been collected and shipped from the province.

The salvage committees at Summerside, Alberton, Tignish, O'Leary Montague, Souris and many of the schools, have contributed their collection to aid in the war effort.

Miss Ruth Simmons rendered a delightful solo of the evening was given by Rev. T. E. McLennan, Charlottetown. Mr. McLennan said: "The real foundation of life depends upon our conception of God."
