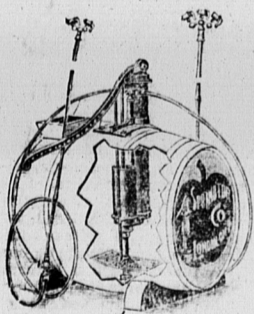

—The latest news, first of all.

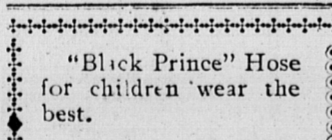

SAVED BOSTON EXPRESS.

GREENWICH, Ct., May 2—To John Gearin and James Bernie, motorman and conductor of the New York & Stamford street railroad, is undoubtedly due the credit of saving the Boston express on the New York, New Haven and Hartford railway which leaves Boston at noon.

When Gearin and Bernie stopped their car on a turn-out in Greenwich, near the New Haven tracks at 4.35, they saw a heavy freight car door lying completely across the west-bound track. Knowing that the express from Boston was nearly due they removed the obstruction just in time.

Both had a narrow escape from being struck by the train which was rushing toward them at 50 miles an hour.

SUFFRAGETTE'S ARM BROKEN.

LONDON, May 2—While Mrs. John Biddulph Martin, formerly Mrs. Victoria Woodhull, was automobiling near Tewkesbury Wednesday afternoon her car came into collision with another automobile.

One of Mrs. Martin's arms was broken and she was severely shaken. Her car, a motor power Mercedes, was badly smashed.

THE LIGHTING CONTRACT.

Sir, Some people seem to have forgotten the old days of electric lighting in Charlottetown and are very anxious to crush out the present company, which has given every satisfaction, simply because it is entirely owned here.

I can well remember when the P. E. Island Electric Company, owned by the Royal Electric Company, Montreal, were pleased with to install an incandescent plant without success until Mr. Full after being assured by the P. E. Island Electric Co. that they would not put in a plant started the Full Electric Co. Some two or three months after Mr. Full's plant was running they sent some old machinery from their factory in Montreal and started a plant to drive Mr. Full out of business. Some few citizens here were induced to purchase the Full Plant to keep it from falling into their hands.

I had the P. E. Island Electric Company's light in my house for some ten years previous to the present Company taking charge, and paid \$4.25 for every 16 c.p. light wired whether they were used or not. We had also to keep kerosene lamps in reserve, as it was not an uncommon thing for whole sections of the town to be without light for a week or more at a time, and the light was so bad at times that we had to light the kerosene lamps to see to read by. The city were, paying them at this time \$90 each per year for old obsolete arc lamps which were out half of the time.

At the present time on the meter system my bill averages \$1.25 a

street lines, removed the unsightly poles, put in the most up-to-date incandescent arc lamps on the streets (for which the city pays \$17 per lamp less than they did in the palmy days of the P. E. Island Electric Co) put the commercial lighting on the meter system giving a much better light at about one half the cost to the consumer, notwithstanding the fact of the very great increase in the cost of coal, labor, &c.

Some people say the Company have made all these improvements out of the earnings, and should not charge as much for light. They certainly have paid for them out of earnings but it took about nine years to do it, and the shareholders never received one cent of dividend for their outlay in that time, and the amount paid for renewals if given in dividends to the shareholders would not be 3 per cent per year for the 9 years. Surely a company composed of citizens living in the town, spending their money and keeping up the place, giving entire satisfaction and charging lower rates than most places in the province are entitled to receive some return for their investment and not to be driven out of business.

This latter seems to be the policy pursued in the case of almost every local enterprise. Do the citizens wish to see everything pass into the hands of outsiders?
