U. S. Air Force Issues Report On Flying Saucers

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—The United States Air Force said officially today the flying saucers "are not a joke."
But in the same breath, the Air Force said it is convinced from nearly two years of careful study that there are "no alarming probabilities" in the mysterious paper prepared by the intelligence division of the Air Materiel Command at Wright-Patterson Field, Ohio, declares:
"Many of the incidents already have answers—meteors, balloons, falling stars, birds in flight, testing devices, etc. Some of them still end in question marks."
The paper added that the "correct tagging" of the remaining percentage is still the job of project "Saucer," of the intelligence division.
The paper, based on the long Air Force study, became available today. It reviews in detail, many of the hundreds of reports of strange flying discs and other objects.
It notes that, directly or indirectly, three persons investigating flying saucer reports have died in aircraft accidents. Two were killed in the crash of a plane carrying what later proved to be scraps of material used in a hoax.
The third, a National Guard pilot flying over Kentucky, pursued to a high altitude what he described on his radio as an object "round like a bear drop" and flying fast and high. His body was found later in the wreckage of his plane. The Air Force decided he had collapsed from lack of oxygen and died before his plane crashed to the earth.
The paper said the possibilities that the saucers are foreign aircraft have been considered.
The investigators also considered—but dismissed—some other and even less likely possibilities, like this:
1. Visitors from Mars—dismissed because although that planet is believed by some astronomers possibly capable of supporting life, it appears to be relatively desolate and inhospitable. Hence "a Martian race would be more occupied with survival than we are on earth."
2. Visits by "some sort of strange extra-terrestrial animals." The paper says "many of the objects described acted more like animals than anything else." But it adds, "there are few reliable reports of extra-terrestrial animals."

John Doran, 12, of Collins Bay village, six miles west of Kingston, Ont., by his alertness and speedy action saved hundreds of passengers in a Toronto-to-Montreal C. N. R. train from possible disaster. Minutes before the "Flyer" was scheduled to pass through Collins Bay, John, noticed a piece of rail, several inches long and broken from the track. He ran 500 yards to the village railway station. Unable to locate the stationmaster, he found his school mate, George Boswell, 16, son of a railway sectionman. Alex Boswell, George brought his father, who picked up flares and a flag and ran three-quarters of a mile west along the track. He flagged the train which screeched to a halt a few feet from the broken rail.

Nutritional Ailments Of Turkey Poults

(Experimental Farm News)
Nutritional ailments caused by vitamin deficiencies should be relatively uncommon in turkey poults brooded on litter covered floors, provided a well-balanced starter mash is fed, says H. I. MacGregor, Dominion Experimental Station, Swift Current, Sask. There are, however, conditions when nutritional ailments do make an appearance. Experience has shown that many of the nutritional ailments, body deformities and susceptibility to disease which are noted in half-grown and mature turkeys are a result of an inadequately balanced diet during the weeks immediately following the actual brooding period. It is a serious mistake to assume that the diet of young growing turkeys does not require as much careful planning as it did during the starting period. The requirement of rapidly growing young turkeys for proteins, minerals and vitamins are relatively high and if good sound bodies, free from skeletal deformities, are to be developed these dietary factors must be supplied throughout the growing period.
Some of the nutritional ailments which may make their appearance are:
Starvation—Many young poults which have been too long without feed, or were weak at hatching time, have difficulty in learning to eat and drink. This can be overcome by spending considerable time with the poults during the first few days to see that they get every opportunity to learn to eat and drink. Each poult should be given a drink and a mouthful of feed as it is placed under the hover. Numerous feeders should be scattered about under the hover so that the poults are never very far from feed. Whole flaked, rolled oats, finely chopped greens and glass marbles scattered on the feed all help to attract attention to it. Keyes type egg case fillers cut in half and well filled with feed can be used for the first few days.
Eating Litter—Poults occasionally get the habit of eating litter, which may fill the digestive system. This can be overcome by a plentiful supply of feeders and by covering the litter for the first few days with opened-out sacks.
Pressure Necrosis—This ailment is commonly referred to as "Caking up of the Beak." Particles of the starter mash build up on both the upper and lower beak, making it almost impossible for the poults to eat. Work at the Dominion Experimental Station, Swift Current, Sask., has indicated that this problem is largely the result of the cereal grain portion of the starter mash being ground too finely.
Dermatitis—This nutritional ailment shows up as a cracking and a formation of excoriations at the angles of the mouth and on the soles of the feet, and occasionally

high potency fortified fish oil, riboflavin if necessary, and dried brewers yeast. Good pasture is an excellent supplement for any diet and should be supplied if at all possible.
The increased interest in confinement rearing of turkeys is almost certain to increase the incidents of nutritional ailments in growing turkeys. It has been shown that diets which were adequate for poults reared on range may not be adequate for poults and growing turkeys reared in complete confinement.
