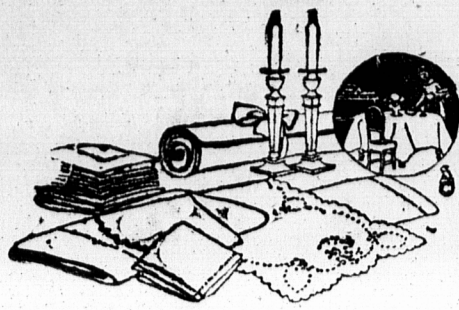

More Imposing Church

were only one frame a day. But its most glorious day, in those remote times, was on the occasion of the pilgrimage of the Viceroy de Tracy and staff, when Sexton Michel Bouchard saw 70 frames dropped into it one after the other. An old story is told of a date from 1765 and is thought to be the work of the famous Duquesnoy.

A rare relic is a mass vestment made and given in 1666 by Anne O. Austria, mother of Louis XIV. Its durability is explained by the fact that the ornaments are of pure silk gold and silver. In thanksgiving for the birth of an heir to the throne of France, Queen Anne ordered some offering to be sent to all the churches dedicated to St. Anne in the kingdom; that sent to Canada was made by her own hands.

There are wonderful vessels contained in the treasury, some of which have aroused the admiration of connoisseurs, such as a silver ciborium, 1667, the first aquasol (chalice), 1668, a silver gilt ostensorium 1667, the first reliquary, 1670; a silver chalice, 1670; a pestle, 1709; a solid silver altar crucifix, 1709, given by the Austrians; Pierre Lemoyne d'Iberville, explorer and first governor of Louisiana, 1709. Other quaint objects include a wax candle mould, 1722, and altar bread irons, 1723, relics of the time when each church made its own candles and wafers.

Rich Decoration.

The interior of the Basilica contained a wealth of rich decorations. The high altar and the side altars were splendid examples of religious artistic design and craftsmanship, being constructed of various marbles. The communion rail was a masterpiece of the sculptor's art. It was 65 feet in length, and along its length were distributed groups symbolizing the mystery of the Holy Eucharist. Five different kinds of marble were used, including white Carrara, yellow Larnate, red onyx, red Grilloite and red Siena.

The majestic statue of St. Anne occupied a prominent place at the extremity of the middle aisle, placed on a wonderfully wrought pedestal, a monolith of Mexican onyx, being the outstanding feature. The pulpit was a rich monument of assorted marbles, gilt, copper and oak, the organ was a fine instrument from the shops of the leading Canadian manufacturer. The side chapels were also richly decorated, and in that dedicated to St. Anthony was placed a commemorative slab of a railway accident in which two priests and twelve other persons of Sherbrooke lost their lives while making a pilgrimage to the shrine in 1895.

The bells had been cast in Leuven and it is recorded that so exact had been the calculation that they were placed in the towers of Beauraire exactly as they left the mould, no file or chisel being required to repair any defect.

The relics of Good St. Anne contained in the Basilica were five in number. The first of these was obtained through the zeal of Mgr. De Laval, who procured it from the Chapter of the Cathedral of Carcassonne, France. To quote the historian: "It is a notable fragment of a finger bone of St. Anne. It was exposed for the first time on the 12th of March, 1670, and has not ceased since then to be an object of fervent devotion."

Other Relics Donated.

A second relic of St. Anne was presented in 1877 by Rev. Nap. LaCiberte. In 1899, Mgr. Bolduc, bequeathed a third relic. In 1891, a bone from the hand of St. Anne was given to Beauraire by the Bishop of Carcassonne. In 1892, the late Cardinal Faucheleant gave to the sanctuary a relic which he had obtained from Pope Leo XIII., a bone from the wrist measuring four inches in length.

In 1880, a relic of another kind was given by Rev. Father Charlemant, of the African missions, a piece of rock taken from the wall of St. Anne's home in Jerusalem. These notes which have been taken from a history of the shrine written by a Redemptorist Father,
