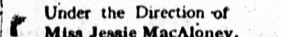

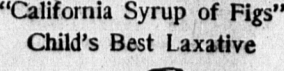

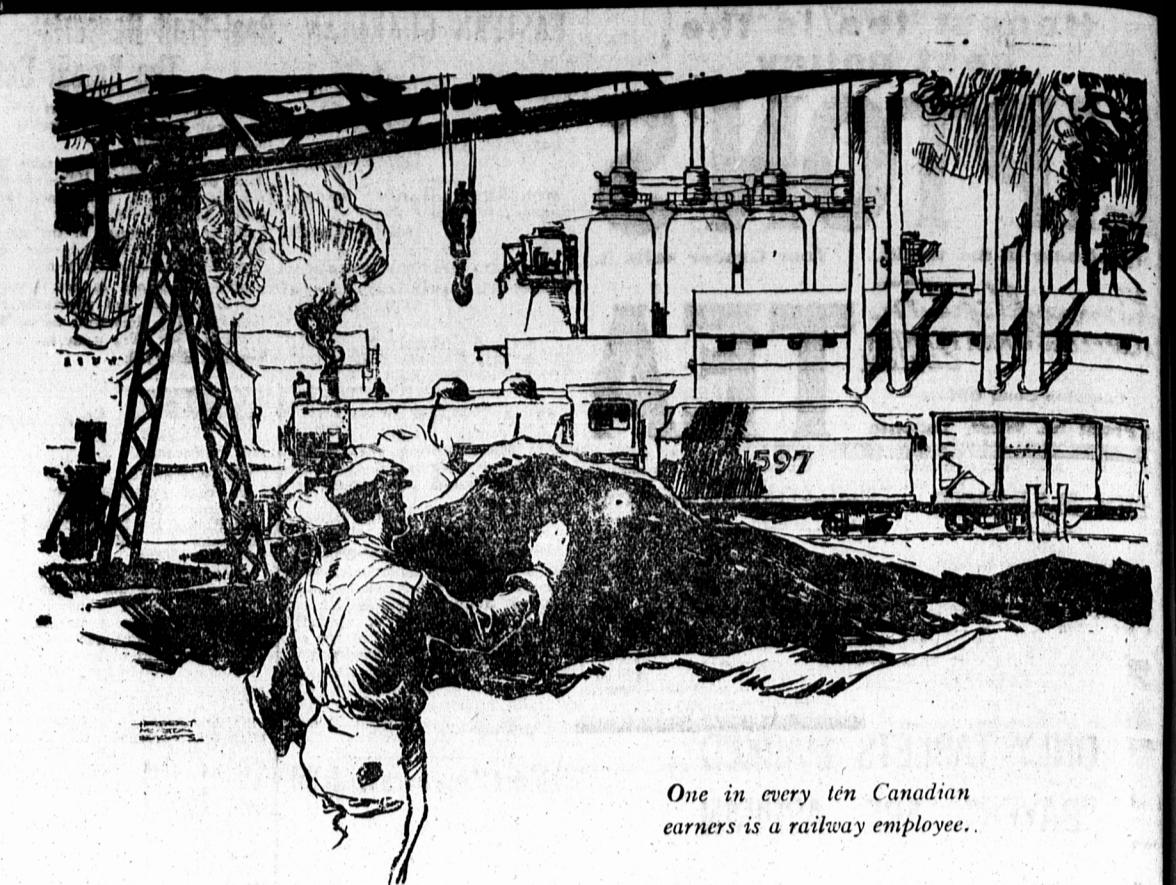

As each train reaches a divisional point these wheels must be tested. For this work nine hundred car inspectors are required

While the train crew pick up their orders, while engines are changed, while ice and water tanks are charged, the Car Inspector strikes each wheel and axle—and listens for the false note that marks a flaw.

### SAYS HE WAS NOT A WILFUL THIEF

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Protesting that he was innocent of wilful theft, and demanding counsel, a man who described himself as Cres Stesi, 33 years old, a Spantard, occupying a furnished room at 134 West Sixty-fourth street, told Magistrate Ten Eyck in West Side Court yesterday that if he really did steal \$85 from a fellow roomer's pocket, as was charged, he must have done it while walking in his sleep.

According to Policeman O'Brien, of the West Sixty-eighth street station, the money was found on Stesi's person when the latter

rushed from the house, followed by his landlady. Charles Frolich, the complainant, and others, who shouted to O'Brien to stop the man. The alleged kleptomaniac was held in \$2,000 bail for further examination Thursday. Frolich is a linotype operator, who works at night and sleeps during the day, he told the court.

"For some time past I had been missing \$5 bills and other sums from my trousers pocket," he testified. "Often the thief didn't even leave me carfare. I didn't mind walking down town, but one night last week I awoke to find my shoes gone. Other tenants reported articles and money missing from their rooms. This morning at 10 o'clock I heard the door knob turn and a man crawled into the room in his stocking feet. I feigned snoring, and the nearer he came the louder I snored. He helped himself to \$85 I collected yesterday. I jumped up and grabbed him by the collar.
