Local Boxers Leave Today For Mainland

Lloyd Carr, Island lightweight boxing champion, accompanied by Harry "Kid" Poulton, holder of the P.E.I. welterweight crown, leave this morning by train for Bridgewater, N.S. where Carr will meet Bob Grace in the main event of a boxing card to be held at the N.S. centre Saturday night.

Poulton, who will not compete at Bridgewater, will continue on to Halifax where he will complete his training for a bout against Red Graham of Dartmouth next Friday at Halifax.

Both local boxers, who are well known here and are highly rated in Island boxing circles, will be in for tough matches in each case. Although neither will have their title at stake the bouts will provide them both with the opportunity they have been seeking for some time to break into the upper ranks in Maritime boxing competition.

Carr's opponent, Grace, is highly rated in Maritime mitslinging circles in the lightweight division, and if Carr can score a victory over the mainland fighter he will be in line for a match with Tilly LeBlanc, who is considered to be the second highest contender for the Maritime lightweight crown.

The match between Harry Poulton and Red Graham, which was scheduled to come off tonight, was postponed for a week due to hockey playoffs at Halifax. Graham, rated high in Maritime ranks in the welterweight class, will be a tough nut for Poulton to crack, but the classy Island slugger is eager for his chance which can put him well up with the leading contenders for Maritime welterweight supremacy.
