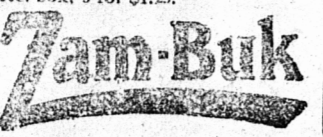

Teachers Union

paid attract but few of our young men and women to the teaching profession, and those only for a short period of service.

3. That the petty salaries paid teaching profession, so that all our wholly set apart for boys, are being instructed by girl teachers—young ducklings being taught to swim by mother hen; that the sex and youthful immaturity of our teachers has forced our schools to become bookish, and so has practically removed from the school curriculum Agriculture and all the subjects and methods that might be termed "man's work";

4. That all our older and experienced teachers are being drawn each year away from our schools to the larger opportunities of the commercial world or to the teaching profession in the other provinces, leaving our children in Prince Edward Island to a series of beginners in the teaching profession and to grow up untaught and untrained, robbed of their heritage; incapable of intelligent citizenship and whereas the teachers of this province realize the commercial and moral value of education and are anxious to remedy existing conditions and give to each child an adequate training for citizenship; and further realize that all educational work in this country must be provincial in its scope—i. e. that the Normal Training of the teachers, the Inspectorial Supervision of the schools, the interchange of teachers from school to school, the grading of pupils and their passing from one school to another, requires all the many schools of Prince Edward Island whether rural or urban to be treated as integral part of the one Educational System.

Therefore be it Resolved that we members of the teaching profession in Prince Edward Island here assembled reaffirm our loyalty to our profession and the cause we serve, and our determination to maintain in face of odds an increasing—it may be an unwelcome struggle for better schools, larger equipment and more efficient teachers for the young people of this prosperous province.

Therefore be it resolved also that the Teachers' Union formed by us for this purpose receive our hearty support, and that the co-operation of every teacher in Prince Edward Island be enlisted in its noble work to impress upon the people of this province the prime importance of Education, so that the Government may be authorized to make adequate provision therefor.

Gratitude to the Clergy. 2. Resolved that this meeting express its gratitude to the clergy for their sympathy and support that they

have given to this agitation for better schools, and would respectfully urge upon them, and upon all the intelligent laymen of this province the importance of joining heartily with the teachers to secure for Prince Edward Island the benefits of a general popular education.

Organized Publicity.

Resolved that the cause of education would be assisted by an organized publicity; that the people might know: 1. The meagre salaries. 2. The number of vacant schools. 3. That Nova Scotia has fixed a minimum salary and the Educational Department has forbidden any teacher to accept less or to underbid on the penalty of cancellation of business.

4. That all the provinces are moving for minimum salaries that are much higher than for Prince Edward Island. 5. That the minimum now fixed by the Presbyterian Church is \$1500 and more instead of \$750 as it was when teachers' salaries were fixed in 1877.

6. That the comparison of salaries paid by the Government to lady teachers on P. E. I., in the years 1877 and 1919 is as follows: 1877, 1st. class \$380; 2nd class \$330; 3rd. class \$280. 1919 1st. class \$337.50; 2nd. \$275; 3rd. class \$212.50.

7. That the comparison of salaries paid by the Government to male teachers on P. E. Island in the years 1877 and 1919 is as follows: 1877 1st. class \$450; 2nd class \$375; 3rd. class \$330. 1919, 1st. class \$445; 2nd. class \$325; 3rd. class 275.

8. That added to the salary in 1877 it was possible to receive a bonus upon a satisfactory report by the Inspector, increasing to a maximum of \$50 according to length of service, and that now no such bonus is available.

9. That in every other walk of life the salary as increased to meet it in supporting the second resolution Dr. Robertson said that this educational crisis had been reached because of the indifference of the people. Even in our country, he said was adding to its school system—actually revolutionizing it. Hawaii had doubled its salaries to teachers—the Department of Education in the U. S. reports large increases to teachers salaries in all the States. We, here in Prince Edward Island cannot remain silent. A teacher in P. E. I. satisfied with present conditions is unworthy to teach. He referred to the action of the Presbyterian Synod with reference to Teachers salaries for the Maritime Provinces. The ministers, he said had urged a minimum of \$1000 but an amendment was made that in case of P. E. I., it should not apply. "How can we," said Dr. Robertson, face the world after that we who live in a land where acre for acre there is not its equal on top of the earth? Compared with the swamps of New Brunswick and the rocks of Nova Scotia however, we are an exception."

President Seaman reported that in an interview with Premier Bell he had been assured that the government would receive a delegation from the Union within the next week. The following delegation was then appointed: Dr. Robertson members of the Union Executive, Principals and Vice-Principals of Charlottetown and Summerside schools and Miss Webster.

President Seaman spoke optimistically regarding the issue. Teachers, too, feel that the government would meet their demands, but, failing the granting of their request they reaffirmed their loyalty to the Union and expressed their determination to stand together to a finish.

Teachers were averse to strikes but many felt that if everything else failed it was the only way to secure education for every child in P. E. I. 50 schools were still vacant. "Education is the bright light of every child," one of the speakers remarked. "To deny that to them is a moral wrong and no person should deny it to the child of his less fortunate neighbour. The Government and the people will be responsible for the 'strike' not the teachers."
