SAAR VALLEY COMMISSION SHORTLY TO BE APPOINTED

To Administer Saar Valley District, while France Exercises Mining Rights there —Sir Robert Borden Mentioned as the Probable Appointee for Canada.

(Special to The Guardian.)

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The first British appointment to be made by the Council of the League of Nations which began its second meeting in London today will be that of a Canadian to the Saar Valley Commission. The Commission will deal with the administration of the Saar Valley district during such time as France is exercising coal mining rights in Saar Basin which were given to her under the peace treaty. It will be composed of three members appointed by the League and the others representing inhabitants of the territory of France and Germany.

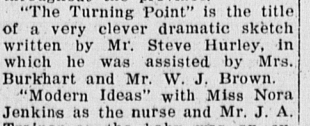

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The effort of the British Liberal party to stage a "comeback" was in the hands of the Scottish voters. Up on the success or failure of Right Hon. Herbert Henry Asquith, former Premier and outstanding leader of the Liberals, political observers said, depends much of the future strength of the party. Asquith is a candidate for the seat of the Paisley district in the Commons in today's by-election, brought about by the death of Sir J. M. McCallum, Independent Liberal, who was elected in December, 1918. His election will give Liberals a sorely needed "strong man" in parliament.
