Resolved that the delegation of potato growers in Ottawa be advised that the Charlottetown Board of Trade is in favor of every effort being put forth by the Federal Government to persuade the British Government to reopen their market to Canadian potatoes and would point out that the large potato shipments from this Province prior to 1925 did not introduce any potato bugs to Britain though they were much more plentiful here than they are now.

REVIEWS EARLY DAYS OF ISLAND—A review of the early history of Prince Edward Island with particular reference to law, was discussed by Mr. Justice Mel-... lish, of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, before the members of the Progressive Club at the weekly luncheon in the Lord Nelson Hotel Tuesday. The meeting was one of the largest the club has enjoyed, and a guest of honor was Judge W. J. O'Hearn of the County Court. Gordon B. Inor, M. L. A. was chairman. Justice Mellish's address was based on an article on the early days of the Island, which he had observed in a recent issue of the Dalhousie Review. The attitude towards human life was depress-... ing in those days, said the speaker. In the schools "bullying" apparently

held sway. Justice Mellish told of a man who, having been convicted of stealing, was ordered to be given 180 lashes. Through intervention of parties the sentence was reduced to fifty lashes. On another occasion a woman was sentenced to be hanged. It was the law that a relative of the person ordered hanged had to be present to see that the execution was carried out. A reprieve was granted only when it was discov-... ered that nobody could be secured to do the hanging. It was put off until someone could be got from the mainland.—Halifax Her-... ald.
