## Monday's Gale In England Hits Fishermen Hard

### Six Hundred Vessels Of Scottish Fleet Lost 31,000 Nets—Marked Shortage Of Fish For Some Time.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 14.—Six hundred vessels of the Scottish fishing fleet lost 31,000 fishing nets in Monday's gale off the east coast, it was revealed today by Rt. Hon. William Adamson, Secretary of State for Scotland. To replace the nets would cost \$750,000, and most of them were lost, but several citizens suffered over and over and destroyed the thriving little town of Throld as an estimated loss of \$150,000. No lives were lost, but several citizens suffered burns. Practically all of the town's 200 inhabitants are today homeless, many without clothing and all without food. The entire business section and residences were burned.

## THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 14.—Dressed poultry prices were slightly lower today. The butter market was somewhat quiet with No. 1 Eastern Townships pasteurized selling at 39 1/2 cents per pound. Saskatchewan butter was offered here today at 36 1/2 cents for No. 1 and 34 1/2 cents for 3 plus freight of 3 cents per pound, while Manitoba butter was offered at 37 1/2 for No. 1 and 35 1/4 cents for No. 3 plus 2 1/2 cents freight. Prices for the retail trade were unchanged. Butter receipts amounted to 118 boxes. The cheese market was unchanged, as was the egg market. Receipts of cheese totalled 1,191 boxes, while egg receipts were 350 cases. The potato market was steady with prices unchanged. Grain prices were unchanged.

## Another Suicide Over Stock Losses

(Special to the Guardian) ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 14.—Stock market losses said to aggregate a million dollars were blamed for the suicide of Robert M. Searle, President of the Rochester Gas and Electric Corporation, at his home here today. He was found on a bathroom floor at his home by Herman Russell, Vice President of the Company, this morning. A gas jet was open and asphyxiation was given as the cause of death. Coroner Richard A. Leonardo issued a certificate of death by suicide during temporary mental derangement.

According to Vice-President Russell, Searle paid a visit to Rochester last week and at that time talked freely of his heavy losses in the Stock Market. He appeared morose and uneasy at that time and associates here tried vainly to console him. He is said to have declared that his original fortune of more than \$1,500,000 was worth less than \$300,000 at present market rates.

## Banks Increase

(Special to the Guardian) REGINA, Nov. 14.—Banking offices have been doubled in number in Regina during the past year. In 1928 operation were carried on by seven bank offices. Today there are fourteen. Banks report a substantial increase in Saskatchewan business. A number of new banks have been opened at northern points, some of them removed from railways. Clearing house figures show big increases, with the Regina total likely to be from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 greater than the figures for 1928.

## LONG SKIRTS VIEWED WITH ALARM

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Not all women are accepting the latest fashionable dictates as to long skirts with equanimity. Fannie Hurst, the American novelist, "views with alarm" what she feels is the first rattle of the old chains of slavery for women, she said. In the last seven years we have shorn our heads, released our legs from the thralldom of limbs and uncorseted our torsos. These things have had an effect on us in other ways. Now, industry with a quirk of his head, reaches out and attempts to put us back. The leg is becoming nasty again with its long silken coverings of skirts. It is no longer merely a means of locomotion. We are pulling in our walslines, if we have them. We are going back right back to where we started from. In far-off Germany Vicky Baum of the Berlin Vossische Zeitung started the revolt with a flaming article in which she announced she refused to wear long skirts "in the day time". The German women, it is reported, feel that walslines and long skirts increase the aesthetic possibilities of evening gowns. Some even go so far as to adopt these features in afternoon frocks. But the working girl in Germany, Britain and the United States, it is said, will not sacrifice the freedom of the short skirt in the day time.

## BANKS IN CANADA ACTING

### Believe Deflation of Stock Prices At Logical "Bottom"—Step Into Breach.

MONTREAL, Nov. 14.—Reassuring indication that, in the opinion of the Banks of Canada, deflation of stock values on the Canadian markets has reached its logical "bottom" and that the banks are prepared to step into the breach in the interests of stabilization was forthcoming tonight when the leading banks, acting together, announced here that they would accept 15 percent on call loans to brokers on stocks over 30 and \$10 per share on issues below that price.

## BELIEVED BOTTOM REACHED

In taking this action to ease the credit position for the brokers, the banks will be benefitting a large number of marginal clients, for brokers generally feel that this will enable them to reduce their marginal requirements and preclude the necessity, in many cases, of sending out further calls. Interviewed tonight, C. E. Neill, vice-president and managing director of the Royal Bank of Canada, expressed the opinion that present market prices were in many instances below the intrinsic values of the stocks. Mr. Neill said he was confident that the brokerage houses on the local street were well able to weather the storm, as they had ample margins with the banks.

## Spirited Rally On Stock Market Sends Prices Up

### Approximately Two Thirds Of Drastic Losses Of Previous Two Days Were Cancelled.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Convincing evidence that both Washington and Wall Street have determined upon a campaign of action to lift destructive pressure from the Stock Market and to fortify industry against injury, sent stock prices into a spirited and impressive rally today, which cancelled approximately two thirds of the drastic losses of the previous two days.

The day brought forth a flood of developments, which will hasten the flow of funds released from speculation into industry. Most conspicuous among these was a further reduction in the New York federal reserve rate discount rate placing it at 4 1/2 percent for the first time since July, 1928.
