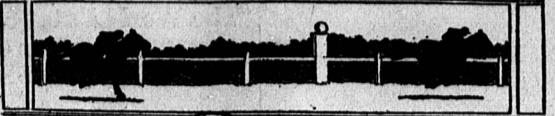

"BODYLINE" BOWLING STILL ACTIVE ISSUE

Nottinghamshire Club Engaged In Controversy Over Question.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Feb. 26—Another stage in the "bodyline" bowling controversy that has agitated cricket circles since 1933 was reached today at a meeting of the advisory country cricket committee.

A resolution was carried unanimously declaring that last season Nottinghamshire had violated an agreement reached in November 1933 by which it was expected the question of "body-line" bowling would be settled by the goodwill and active co-operation of club captains.

The resolution added it was found difficult to reconcile a recent statement that the policy of Nottinghamshire is to adhere to Marylebone Cricket Club rules with an no-confidence vote passed at a recent mass meeting of members.

The members attacked the committee because it endorsed the sending of an apology to Australian cricket authorities for so-called "body-line" bowling by Nottingham players against the Antipodean touring team last year.

The committee of the Nottinghamshire County Cricket Club at a meeting last month decided to resign in a body at the annual meeting following a no-confidence vote passed at a mass meeting of members.
