IN MEMORIAM

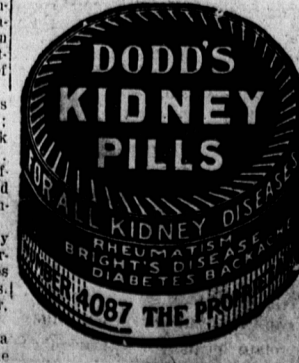
