Plans for a half-million dollar construction program in Prince Edward Island by the Maritime Electric Company, Ltd., were outlined to a Guardian representative on Saturday by the company's provincial manager, Mr. V. A. Ainsworth.

"Sufficient material has been received, Company to proceed this year with its plans for constructing an electric power extension from Charlottetown to Borden, via Bonshaw." Mr. Ainsworth said. This extension, when completed, will provide a firm source of electric power from the Company's steam plant in Charlottetown, to Borden, Tryon, Albany, and other districts now being served by a small power plant at North Tryon, which is now over-loaded. Power from the new source will result in reduced rates to consumers in the territories mentioned, and will make available a steady source of electrical energy to farmer and other residents along the South Shore. This line will also serve as a main feeder to provide power to farmers along intersecting roads as a further development.

"The Company has many other rural extensions already planned, which will be constructed as materials have been granted and materials become available.
