Budget Debate In Legislature

Following is a continuation of the budget debate in the Legislature on Tuesday:

Mr. P. A. McIsaac, First Kings, first congratulated Mr. LePage on being chosen to represent the Government at the Coronation, and the Government on choosing such a worthy representative. Mr. LePage had noted that in the British Parliament the members and their speeches, and the reason for their "nonsense," "I think that some of the members in this House would profit by the example of the greatest Mr. McIsaac, his manuscript in hand.

Some of the members had spoken on the Budget, he complained, "without any effect for their fellow men." If they had studied the Accounts he did not think they would have been "so inaccurate in some of their statements."

He was surprised to learn that one district in Prince County paid as much in taxes as the whole of King's County. "Well, we have got to take our medicine, and I think that we will give the biggest dose of it to the member from Georgetown who has brought on this question. Statistics fully demonstrated, he said, that districts represented by "some of the most members who have found the most fault with the Government" have been the ones that were "getting the most dough." He called it "dough" because paid to the tune of 13 to 1—a baker's dozen to every dollar of taxes they pay. For that reason he did not think they had any just complaint.

Before criticising the Government members should ask if there had been any undue expenditures. He did not think there were. "It is true that we had a deficit larger than we anticipated or hoped for, and it may not be the last," but where, he asked, was the extravagance? He failed to see any item that could be better than without causing distress and inconvenience to many people throughout the Province. The financing had been handled by the Government "much better than we could have done," he added.

Members, he complained, are inclined to insist on expenditures in their own interest, and then rail at the Government if it comes out with a deficit.

Mr. McIsaac reviewed various items under the heading of uncontrollable expenditures.

Hog Production

He stressed livestock production as probably the most promising source of revenue to which the average producer can turn his attention.

While it was fortunate that hog production in the province showed a gradual increase for the past few years, and this year is a banner one, yet the benefits derived from hog production are not enjoyed in every part of the province, nor as intensively as they might be even in recognized hog sections. Mr. McIsaac declared. He was glad to hear the Premier state that it was the intention to give particular attention to the non-producing sections, and, as well, to the scattered non-producing individuals located even in producing areas. He considered this a wise move, as further expenditure upon producers who are now well established would be uncalled for.

Church Services

At the evening service part of Sir John Stainer's "Crucifixion" was sung by the choir and also the "Song of the Cross" by the choir.

At both services the scripture lessons were read by Mr. George Hart of the Prince Street School staff.

ST. DUNSTAN'S BASILICA

Services at the Basilica began at 9 o'clock yesterday morning when the choir sang the Mass of the Resurrection. Rev. Dr. McMahon was High Priest, with Father George McDonald as Deacon, Father McDonald as Sub-deacon, and Father McDonald and Murphy of Saint Dunstan's University as Deacons of honor.

Music appropriate to the occasion was sung by a full choir of the Church last evening as directed by Miss Marie Paquet as organist.

Throughout the day the Cross was venerated.
