NANTUCKET HAS A TOWN CRIER NANTUCKET, MASS., Aug. 27.—Experts in efficiency may have their undisputed way throughout the great majority of American centres, but in this town of the Massachusetts coast is preserved at least one reminder of another day.

### Fisherman To Seek Gov't Aid

(Canadian Press) NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 27.—Two hundred shore fishermen demanding market classification with higher prices and cheaper bait are appealing to Dr. L. W. Johnstone, Dominion member of parliament for this constituency requesting an investigation into the industry, following a ban placed on small cod, and the refusal to buy cod not measuring 23 inches, by local buyers. This may result in the local fleet disposing of the catches elsewhere.

The local fish dealers have also placed a ban on iced fish and require a daily catch in order to retain the high quality of fish called for by the various buyers throughout Canada and the American markets. The fishermen state they would not land any more cod here, but would carry their catch to Glace Bay where a dealer is ready to handle their fares at a higher price than that which has been paid here.

At present Canso fishermen are getting 1 1/2 cents for their large cod; 1 1/2 cents for market cod and haddock, and 75 cents per hundred pounds for schak and scrod. Local fishermen have been getting 1 1/2 cents for steak, 1 1/2 for market, one-half cent for haddock and scrod. Local buyers say it is impossible to increase prices at the present time and two large buyers say they will be forced to close their doors rather than increase the present price, which is being governed by the market prices and the quality of the fish received.

#### CARAMEL CUSTARDS

The common understanding in regard to a caramel custard is that it is a custard baked in a caramel lined cup, or caramel lined dish of some sort. This is made on the famous French model, cream reverse, which is always turned out of the cup or dish in which it is baked, and usually some of the caramel melts and surrounds the custard, while it leaves a nice layer as a sort of icing on top of it.

But there is another way to make caramel cup custards that is agreeable in this case the caramel is merely used for flavor. To make a cup custard of this type, take two cups of milk and half a cup of cream, two eggs, or perhaps three if you like, and three or four tablespoons of sugar with a few drops of almond extract. It can be made a little sweeter if desirable.

Melt one tablespoon of the sugar in a tiny shallow saucepan over the fire, add half a cup of milk to it and stir and cook until the caramel has dissolved. Beat the two eggs slightly, add to them the rest of the milk and sugar, remembering that we can use more if we choose. Then add this combination of milk and egg to the caramel mixture, pour into six small buttered cups, set these in a pan of hot water and bake for 30 or 40 minutes in a moderate oven until they set and have a flat top. If the fire is too hot the top of the custard will be sunken, because it has boiled and foamed. Some people seem to think that cup custard which has a perfect well in it is good, and it really is not nor wholesome either.

In making a caramel custard, we may save out the egg whites if we choose to use them as a meringue for the custard, which may be put on during the last 10 minutes of cooking. Because of its pronounced caramel flavor, a caramel custard is all right with the meringue on top of it. As to the caramel flavor it may be more pronounced by caramelizing more sugar, but try the lesser amount first. The finest custards are always made with the yolk of the egg only and in this case they can be more like what we call a pastry cream, which has, in addition to the egg yolk, thickening with cornstarch or flour.

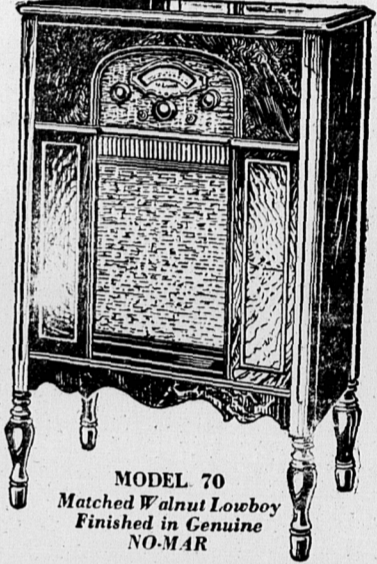

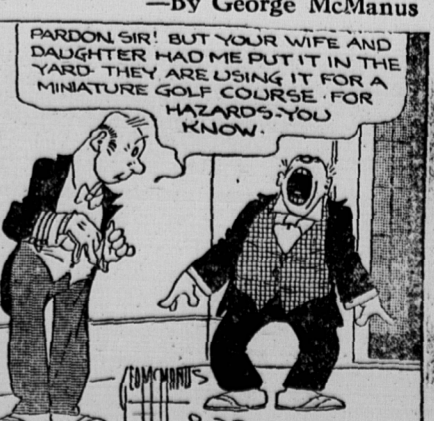
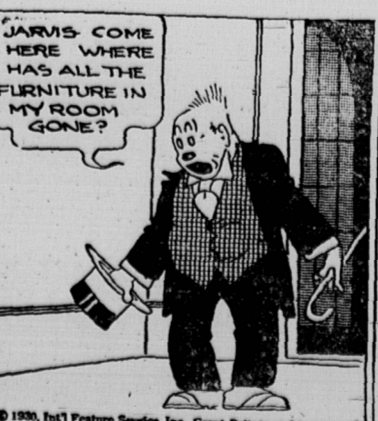
