THE EDITOR'S MAIL. THE DIVES AND THE POLICE.

SIR.—The sound of the curfew bell is heard with punctilious regularity still, I think, that those who expect much from its warning voice are disappointed. It is only the zealous and energetic enforcement of laws for the promotion of morality, decency and order which has any permanent value. We must not solace ourselves with the idea that things are just exactly what they seem. Many are asking why the municipal authorities permit the various all night and Sunday dives to carry on their nefarious business, in undermining the morals of many young people of both sexes. It is difficult to reform those who should have better sense, let the boys and girls, at least, be saved from contamination. On King Street, between Queen and Pownall Streets one of those pestilential stews exist, a disgrace and a shame, which seems to enjoy immunity in annoying the neighborhood and being a menace to public morals. It is in dark places where no sunshine penetrates, that the microbes of disease breed and flourish. It is in the dark places of our social life that the microbes of immorality likewise grow and flourish. It is only the careless and indifferent who believe that public morality is not worth preserving. This is the class that is satisfied with the mere ringing of the curfew bell to impress on the youthful mind the lesson that there are better influences for good in the home than in the company of the vicious on the streets or in such dives referred to above.

I hope Mr. Editor that the proper authorities will bestir themselves and fearlessly make an example of those who are daring and defying everyone to stop them in trampling under foot these laws which are the only safeguard of society.

Ottawa on Return After Their Hopeful Mission

Three Propositions Made to the Government Which Minister Sutherland Regards Favorably—Our Members.

TELEGRAPH DELEGATES FOR HOME. OTTAWA, May 12.—Special.—The Prince Edward Island Telegraph delegation left for home on Monday with the exception of Hon. J. F. Whear who will remain for a couple of days in reference to the Island's cable in connection with the Mainland.

WHAT THE DELEGATES PROPOSED. They laid three propositions before the

Government, one to secure the necessary service that the Island desires with the existing Company; second to buy out the Company, and third to ascertain in the courts whether the Company's monopoly had not expired and if so then lay a new cable.

SUTHERLAND FAVORABLY IMPRESSED. The Minister of Public Works, Hon. James Sutherland, was favorably impressed with the necessity for a better service.

The whole matter will be taken up shortly by the Government with a view to reach a solution of the difficulty.

REPRESENTATION REDISTRIBUTED

The Committee Submits a plan for All the Provinces

Prince County to Lose a Member—Kings to Have One, Queens Two—How Ontario, New Brunswick and N. S. Fare.

OTTAWA, May 11.—At a meeting of the redistribution committee today the following schedule was submitted for the redistribution of Ontario:

ONE MEMBER COUNTIES.

Glengary Prescott, Stormont, Russell, Dundas, (except London); Grenville, Frontenac, Kingston, Lennox and Addington, Prince Edward, Durham, Victoria, Peel, Halton, Dufferin, Wentworth, (except Hamilton); Norfolk, Haldimand, Lincoln, Welland, London, Nipissing, Haliburton, and Muskoka, Parry Sound, Thunder Bay.

COUNTIES WITH TWO MEMBERS.

Ottawa, Lanark, Leeds, Renfrew, Hastings, Northumberland, Peterborough, Ontario, Wellington, Bruce, Perth, Waterloo, Hamilton, Brant, Oxford, Elgin, Lambton, Kent, Essex, Algoma.

COUNTIES WITH THREE.

Simcoe, York, Grey, Huron, Middlesex.

TORONTO TO HAVE FIVE.

Toronto is to have five members, but no statement has been made as to whether this is Toronto as constituted for municipal purposes, with a population of 208,000, or Toronto as constituted for electoral purposes with a population of 156,000. Two additional members are given to New Ontario and one to Toronto under the proposed arrangement.

COUNTIES WIPED OUT.

This involves a loss of nine seats to the remainder of the Province, six seats lost under the census and three additional seats given to New Ontario and Toronto.

HOW ONTARIO STANDS.

26 Counties retaining one each—26. 20 Counties retaining two each—40. 5 Counties retaining three each—15. Toronto retaining 5. Total 86.

No proposal as to the division of the twenty Counties and the five counties above referred to have been submitted to the committee, but they will be on Friday next.

THE ISLAND REDISTRIBUTION.

In Prince Edward Island boundary lines will be followed. This would give two members to Queens, one to Kings, and one to Prince.

HOW IT STRIKES NOVA SCOTIA.

In Nova Scotia it is likely that Victoria will be added to Cape Breton and that one member will be dropped in Pictou.

NEW BRUNSWICK AND QUEBEC.

In New Brunswick Albert will probably be joined to Kings.

No county disappears in Quebec. All the parishes that were taken away by the gerrymander will be restored to the original Counties to which they belonged.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL. AGAINST HOOPER AVENUE.

SIR.—The residents of the Malpeque Road one and all are indignant at the treatment accorded them by the City Council on Monday evening, also at the action of their representative, Hon. Hooper in forcing them to have the Malpeque Road named Hooper Avenue against the direct wishes of the people. A petition signed by no less than seventy-three of the residents of the Road was presented to the Council asking to have the name changed to Elm Avenue in appreciation of the excellent work the Council had done on the street and planting a row of elm trees on each side of the Malpeque Road. I strongly object to having the road called Hooper Avenue and consider it a piece of imposition on the part of Councillor Hooper voting for it against the direct wishes of his constituents.

As a matter of courtesy the residents of the Road should have the privilege of naming it what they wish. Let us have an indignation meeting at once condemning the action of our representative which has not a parallel in the history of the Council. There is not a half dozen people living on the Malpeque Road who want it named Hooper Avenue and to say the least of it, it shows very poor taste.
