Mr. Sharam had his fish drying on the flakes in the day, and left them packed up in bundles in the evening, his flakes being very close to his house. Mr. Sharam was out in a schooner fishing the night his fish were stolen. It would seem as though some person or persons make a business of prowling around the fishermen's flakes in the silent midnight hours on pilfering missions, for the writer was told that a young man coming home at a late hour one night, espied some one at the fish flakes near Beach Point trying to get some fish on the same easy terms. Of course the young man pursued the thief, but he being a fleet runner as well as a stealthy thief, he was not to be caught. It is a great pity that this person who evidently prefers getting fish in a cheaper and easier way, than buying fishing gear and tolling for them, could not be caught and introduced to a room in Dorchester Penitentiary where he would be obliged to give a little help, without pay therefor, and where he might through time take a notion to read the New Testament and resolve to lead a more honorable life. The fishermen, as is well known, find difficulty in procuring sufficient fish to pay their bills and buy the necessities of life—and especially this season when fishing has been so poor—without having their fish stolen by some disreputable villain who should be enclosed within the walls of a penitentiary spinning oakum or performing some other hard work, instead of running at large and going on midnight missions around the fisherman's buildings and flakes where the fruits of their toil are placed and prepared for market. Assuredly he is on the rounds this season again, as Mr. Sharam's case proves; and in the writer's opinion it would pay and certainly be safer for all fishermen to procure a 60 cent padlock and a bulldog, for even in this age there are some who if they could get them on terms of "settlement on judgement day" they would take all the hake, codfish, etc. they could get hold of and they wouldn't mind taking a good fat ham or two on the same terms. Nature Study in Rural Schools.

Professor Robertson while in England this summer did not wholly confine his effort for Canada's good, to telling the people of the British Isles what good butter and excellent cheese, fine beef and appetizing bacon were being produced in this country, and the best way to transport them across the Atlantic. He tried to learn all he could in educational methods along the lines he is following in the McDonald seed grain competition and the manual training now in operation in Canada. As a result of these observations it is proposed by Sir William McDonald to start a number of schools, about twenty, we believe, in the different provinces where special effort will be made to train the faculties of the children in the sort of life they will mostly lead when they grow up, instead of leading them into the realm of knowledge only through books. The aim will be not to follow too closely the methods adopted in the English schools visited, but try to embody in our curriculum what in their seems best adapted to this country. Professor Robertson visited a school in Bunsby, Cheshire, and says: "The teachers there had been giving lessons on plants, insects, and other objects in the locality, for over thirty years, and about seventy per cent. of the boys from that school have settled in the neighboring country." "I would not say that what I observed was attributable to the instruction given at the school, but taking the farm teachings and the appearance of the country, its neatness and the excellent condition of the pastures and cattle, as I drove through it would characterize it as one of the most thrifty and prosperous districts in England." The Professor goes on to say: "I think I would be warranted in saying that a good deal of this excellence was owing to the training of the faculties of observation and thinking on matters that concern the daily life of the people. One seemed to find a more intelligent look in the faces of the children in that school than in the faces of the children in most of the rural schools in England, showing that the result is really the culture and development of the intelligence far more than any special aptitude of the land or even knowledge of agriculture. We sometimes complain that wealthy Canadians are not so ready as others to give their money to advance the public good. This charge cannot be against Sir William McDonald.

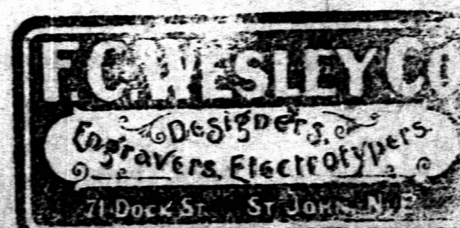

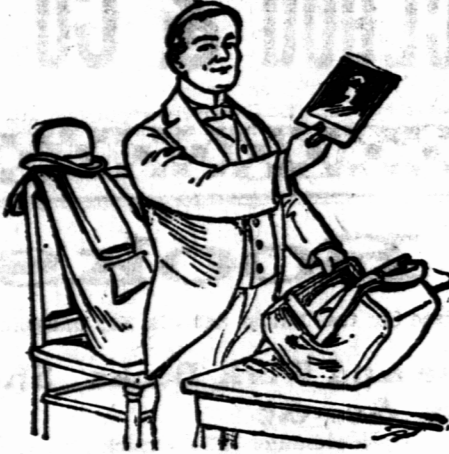
