THE EMPIRE VISION

The current issue of "United Empire" contains the summary of an inspiring address on the British Empire by Colonel John Buchan, C.H., M.P., in which the changes in the conception of Empire within his own recollection are vividly depicted by the speaker.

Since the Great War, the revised conception of Empire has become that of an alliance of sovereign peoples, a new type of union which revealed a profound and essential unity. The glamour has not departed, but the old racial arrogance has largely gone out.

Colonel Buchan concluded: That is a greater thing than we thought of 30 years ago, for it is no longer a boy's dream, but a man's purpose. This is a year of Imperial centenaries and commemorations, in Australia, in Canada, and elsewhere.

Another country gone dictator is Belgium, but for budget purposes only, it is explained. Unfortunately, it is the financial side of government that most directly and intimately affects everybody.

The prospect of two brothers heading Britain's two great national churches is seen in a rumour current in both Edinburgh and London. Among ministers mentioned for the moderatorship of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, is Rev. Dr. Marshall Lang.

A HELLSH TRAFFIC

Perhaps never before has the desire for world peace been given such general expression as it was on Sunday last. Throughout the world, wherever the anniversary of Armistice Day was observed, public opinion on this subject found passionate voice in denunciation of war and war's atrocities.

Outstanding revelations of the nature of this traffic have lately been revealed. The latest exposure is in a biography of Sir Basil Zaharoff, by Guiles Davenport, of which the following statements are a sample:

Under no circumstances is it possible to destroy a whole class. Its wealthier members could at the first sign of danger transfer their bank deposits to safer countries. Not a few of the Russian nobility and industrialists succeeded in saving part of their fortunes by various means. With the exception of the Russian, every attempt to destroy capitalism has led to fascism or other forms of reaction.

PREVENTING SERIOUS CONSEQUENCES FROM FLU

The various and newer methods of treating influenza are outlined in the book, and the results are spoken of very favorably but the conclusion is that despite these methods "there is no definite specific remedy for influenza."

They believe that the most important measures in the treatment of influenza are:

- 1. The patient should go to bed at once, and remain in bed until the temperature has been normal for two days.
2. The intestine should be cleared out daily, or twice daily, as an attack of influenza tends to cause constipation.
3. The patient should be kept warm and encouraged to perspire by means of hot bottles and hot drinks.

As a result of the incident Australia has become aware of her responsibility to the "oldest inhabitants" as she has never done before. Already a system has been suggested for the appointment of patrol officers, with certain magisterial powers, the work to be carried out by men who have a full knowledge of the native customs and languages.

Australia's experience brings out sharply the strides that Canada has made in meeting a similar problem, particularly in the case of her Eskimo wards. Thanks to the fine work of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, who have from the first appreciated the necessity of being acquainted with the habits and customs of the Eskimo.

This is another feather for the Mounties caps, but members of the "silent force" who, by their skill in the saddle, have aroused the admiration of the world.

Gradually the "Mounties" are seeing greater variety of service. Sixty years ago their sole business was the preservation of law and order in the vast and thinly populated Northwest, and on towards the Arctic Circle.

Another Trade Stunt

(Toronto Globe) A recent issue of a Welsh newspaper and advertisement which discloses something of the difficulty of competing in international business with a country like Germany.

Apparently the interpretation is that an exporting firm in England can get £100,000 worth of German business, provided an equivalent amount of German goods is bought, and somebody is willing to pay 20 per cent. commission to put the deal through.

(Ottawa Journal) Mr. Bennett's address to the Ottawa convention of the Canadian Association of Tourist and Publicity Bureaux contained in a few words the ideal "code" of the tourist industry.

The organized effort such as is represented in the Government's new tourist branch largely is dependent for its success upon the attitude of individual Canadians towards the stranger in their midst. Advertising and propaganda can bring the tourist, but nothing will bring him a second time if the pleasure of his first visit has been buried in unpleasant incidents or annoying experiences.
