Great Racing At Montague

Almost Record Crowd At Popular Track Yesterday.

A perfect day, an almost record crowd and sensational racing were the features at Montague yesterday afternoon. There were four races on the card which brought together good, evenly balanced fields of horses and not one of the races was won in straight heats, unexpected episodes occurring which kept the spectators right on their tiptoes and made certainties very uncertain.

The first race was the 2.17 Trot and Pace with four starters. Con Frisco, 2.07 1-4, the good American trotter did not start. Mr. Gerow deciding to save her for her contest at Charlottetown next week.

Bingen Aubrey won the first heat under "wraps," looking as though he could do 2.12. In the second heat he got away badly, then got mixed up with Major S., who made a break and Grandma, who is not to be sneezed at in the speed line, captured the heat, despite the strenuous efforts of Bingen Aubrey's driver to get to her. Watts Edition showed a lot of speed for the first half but could not carry the clip, and finished third. In the third heat Grandma got away well but Bingen Aubrey caught her at the quarter and raced her into a break, then went on and won by an open length. Grandma second, Major S., third, Watts Edition fourth.

2.21 TROT AND PACE

This was a race that horsemen were greatly interested in. Lucky Lindy was known to possess a real brand of speed as his racing conflict with Billy Cops at New Annan showed. Great tales had drifted down from Kensington of what Jacqueline would do to him, so that there was anxiety on all sides to see this pair hook up and settle the question of supremacy. The result was a great race which did not end in favor of either horse, but went to the discounted and over-looked Hal Tipton. The day previously at Charlottetown Hal Tipton was being given a workout, in the course of which a shadow appeared on the track which he took to be some deadly monster. He jumped almost out of his hollies and landed full force on the track, a broken sulky and a badly jolted driver resulting. Hal also appearing slightly the worse for the experience. Some of the shrewdest of the horse fraternity were occupying the "Baby" Grandstand and various remarks were made: "What on earth do they cart a horse like that around for," etc., etc., being the most complimentary. Imagine their surprise yesterday when Hal Tipton finished like a bearcat, full of vim and vigor, past two dead tired, wobbly steeds, in the third heat in 2.16 1-2. Why, it almost broke the Pari-Mutual machine! One man who was no doubt looked upon as a lunatic by the other speculators, invested \$4.00 on Hal Tipton and got the entire receipts, amounting to over \$100. Was it judgment or was it blind chance? THIS is a race worth writing up, so we will endeavor in the short space at our command to give a little word picture of it, assuming that you have gotten yourselves into the state of nerves of those who sympathized with either Lindy or Jacqueline.

First Heat—Lindy rushed past. Jacqueline and grabbed the pole before the first turn was reached. Jacqueline trailed in behind. The first half was stepped in 1.06 1-2. At the three-quarter pole Semple made a try with Jacqueline and raced neck and neck with Lindy to the turn, but could not get by so took back. Turning into the home stretch he pulled out again and both drivers got busy with their whips and a rattling drive to the finish resulted. Lindy winning by a foot. Time 2:13 1/4, one half second behind the track record of 2:13 made by Mary Volo 2.08 1-2, last year.

Second Heat—Jacqueline went away very fast and took the pole from Lindy, who seemed to be bad galloped and steadily lost ground, being passed by Alliewood the Great. Hal Tipton and Peter All Right and finishing last horse. Subsequently it was found that the trouble was due to his getting his tongue back under the bit.

Third Heat—Lucky Lindy went right after Jacqueline from the word go and they raced like a team down to the quarter pole in 31 seconds. There driver Semple was heard to shout to driver McNeill. "You'll never get past this mare!" The battle continued to the half in 1.04 1-2, then to the three quarter pole in 1.39, then Lucky Lindy fell behind and on the home stretch was second horse. Then something occurred which made the spectators absolutely gasp, for from nowhere, Hal Tipton appeared coming strong and proved an easy winner while Jacqueline and Lindy, very much tired from their strenuous first half were passed by Peter All Right, who trotted a really good heat. Time 2:16 1-2.

Fourth Heat. The three horses, Hal Tipton, Lucky Lindy and Jacqueline went out to race one heat to decide the winner of the race. Lucky Lindy took the pole from Hal Tipton very shortly after the word, and held it almost to the half. Then Tipton went by him and started to open up daylight, followed by Jacqueline. The two were well in the lead when Lindy was seen to throw his head about, then to stagger, and finally down he went, but so easily and nicely that he did not hurt himself or injure his driver or sulky. The crowd rushed to him, but Driver McNeill had sensed the trouble. Lindy had gotten his tongue back of the bit and out off the air supply from his lungs, making him dizzy and causing him to fall. Some horses develop this habit and it is necessary to tie their tongue to prevent accidents. This ended a great race with Hal Tipton crowned the winner, showing again the truth of Sir John A. MacDonald's famous statement that elections and horse races are the most uncertain things on earth.

2.27 TROT AND PACE—This was a real honest to goodness horse race and no place for weakings or those whose nerves would be disturbed by shouts and yells, cracks of whips, uncomplimentary language at times, etc. No less than ten tried their luck with York Oia, winner of the necessary two in nice style, but had a great fight with Barita Aubrey in the first heat, just nosing her out in a dandy finish. In the second heat it was Dixie Marque who carried the fight to him, with LaCopia the Great another excellent contender. The third heat because, also driven by Jardine, who landed Hal Tipton so beautifully, surprised the talent by coming with a rush on the home stretch and heading LaCopia the Great, who seemed to have the heat clinched, in the last two strides. Fernwood Aubrey who had bad racing luck the first two heats, showed up in fine style in this heat. Getting away badly she went around six horses and showed real speed, finishing a close third. This was a good race with a big field of horses. Best time 2:17.

2.30 TROT AND PACE COUNTY RACE

HAD another good field of horses and developed into a four heater before being finally decided in favor of Bob Kentworthy, a big, bold going trotter owned by Albert Quigley, St. Peters. The first heat was won by Bob but in the second and third he made disastrous breaks. Dr. Setzer copping the second in a nice drive, while Eva Brook won the third in a very pretty finish. In the fourth Bob and Eva had a rattling fight from the three-quarter pole home. Bob just having the one step to the good of Eva at the finish. A real nice race, we would say. Best time 2:22 1-2.

Lord Dawson of Penn Says

Moderation Not Prohibition Needed.

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.—While it was commonly recognized that some public control of the sale of alcoholic beverage was needed, with a view to securing moderation in consumption and proper standards of quality and strength, "I put it to you that because alcohol is used in excess by some, it should be abandoned by all is unsound reasoning," Lord Dawson of Penn, physician in ordinary to His Majesty the King, told the members of the Canadian Club here yesterday.

The general application of the argument of abandoning the use of alcohol would lead to negation and gloom. "Because some love well rather than wisely are we to cease our worship of Venus? Because speech sometimes maddens us, are we to ordain silence?" Lord Dawson asked.

The noted physician, who is widely known to Canadians for his services as consultant during the war to the Canadian corps, and who is an honorary graduate of McGill University, took as his subject "Alcohol, its power to do and undo."

Legislative restraints which exceed the sanctions of public opinion fall and created reactions contrary to the public weal, he thought.

—DOING NICELY—It is pleasing to report that Mr. Lemuel McLean, of Bayside, is making satisfactory progress towards recovery. Mr. McLean was brought to the hospital between twelve and one o'clock on Monday night, suffering from severe scalp wounds and abrasions about the body; also a badly fractured right arm and leg. The injured man, who was round seventy years of age, was driving a team of horses when they ran away and dragged him some distance along the ground. Friends are glad to hear that he is recovering.
