THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press.)
OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 26—Eggs—The egg situation throughout Canada continues firm under recent advances at most points. Sharp advances in the New York and Chicago markets have brought a better feeling here and are attributed to the fact that storage on the four big markets yesterday were 30,000 cases over the same date last year. Reports from Ontario country points state that of 32,000 seconds 25 to 30, jobbing extras 22 to 45, firsts 33 to 40, seconds 32 to 35.

Calgary—Change reported from this market with dealers quoting country points extras 32, firsts 38, seconds 24.

Edmonton market is unchanged with dealers quotations to country slipper extras 31, firsts 27. Vancouver dealers are paying country points extras 46, firsts 43, jobbing extras 50, firsts 48, seconds and pullets 42. Live poultry is unchanged.

St. John with light arrivals and fair demand, and the market continues firm. Retail fresh extras 50, firsts 45.

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 27—The export trade in all kinds of Canadian grain here Saturday was reported quiet, there being no improvement in the demand from foreign buyers and in consequence exporters showed little disposition to operate with the result that only a small business was done with local and country buyers and the market was quiet.

The tone of the market for Quebec and Ontario oats was steady. No. 2 white in car lots selling 50 cents. No. 3 white at 48 cents, and No. 4 at 46 cents per bushel, extra, while Ontario malting barley was dull and nominally quoted at 81 cents per bushel, extra.

While the volume of business transacted in the spring and winter wheat flour markets was small prices were steady. A good steady trade continues to be done in all kinds of milled and the undertone to the market remains firm. Standard grades of rolled oats were quiet. Prices for all grades of eggs were well maintained under a good steady demand. The butter market continued active and firm. A fair trade was transacted in cheese and prices were firmer.

Buried Man Alive; Court Frees Them

LONDON, Sept. 27—The Evening News correspondent at Allahabad, British India, chronicled a peculiar case in which two Hindus were charged with aiding a Hindu ascetic to commit suicide by refilling a grave into which he had voluntarily descended. The accused men admitted their part in the affair, but said they were disciples of the ascetic and were bound to obey his instructions. It was also pleaded in their defence that the Holy Man had not committed suicide, but merely performed the religious rite of "Samadhi," that of being buried alive, while in a state of suspended animation.

POLICEMAN DEMOLISHED

Some time ago it was the painful duty of the Guardian to record an attack upon one of the policemen of this city, an attack all the more sensational because made by a clergyman. On Saturday afternoon a more savage and dastardly attack was made upon another member of the traffic force, with the result that for hours afterwards pieces of that particular policeman could be found scattered about the street. It is not known whether the clergyman and undertakers are now in league for their mutual benefit, but he is currently reported that this latest attack was made by one of the latter. The traffic policemen of this city are of a very inoffensive type and are never heard addressing the travelling public in aggressive or sarcastic language. The fact of the matter is that as yet no one has ever heard them say as much as a single word, but have even in such provocative cases as this, maintained what can perhaps only be termed a wooden silence.

SCHOONER LOST

Whist on her way to Summerside from Pictou, N. S. with load of coal for the C. N. R. on Thursday afternoon, the schooner Glynod, owned by Mr. R. J. McNeill, of Tyne Valley, sprang a leak and sank in 17 fathoms of water between Borden and Tormentine. The cabin was but full of water when the vessel was headed for shore with the intention of beaching her, but there was quite a gale blowing and she sank almost immediately. In fact the boat was awash on the deck before Capt. Hoddard, a Cape Bretoner, and the crew of the vessel, all belonging to Newfoundland, took to the boats, abandoning all their belongings. It is very doubtful whether they would have reached shore safely; but, providentially, the schooner J. H. Ernest, of Summerside, commanded by Capt. East of Victoria, was only a mile ahead and also coming to Summerside with C. N. R. coal. Capt. East, on seeing the Glynod's predicament, at once turned about, picked up the crew and brought them and their dry and wet cargo to Summerside. It is understood that there was no insurance.

BRUSSELS, Sept. 26—Bargain rates on radium are foreseen by experts in the development of the Belgian Congo radium industry. At present the price of radium is 1,000,000 francs a gramme, but the discovery of further radium bearing deposits, in the Congo, is tending to cut the price.
