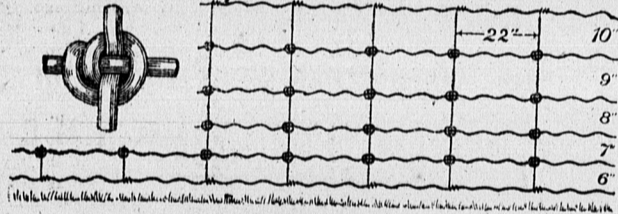

MR. PATON IN LONDON.—In an interesting letter to a friend, Mr. James Paton, M. L. A., describes some of his experiences in London where he is visiting his wounded son, Lieut. Rowland Paton, M. C. Mr. Paton arrived in London "just in time to give President Wilson a hearty welcome." The Londoners certainly turned out in good style and gave him a grand reception. Mr. Paton was lucky along with the London auto club windows where he obtained a splendid view of the great procession and a good look at the King, President Wilson, the Queen, Princess Mary and Mrs. Wilson. One of the greatest attractions in the parade was the Scots Guards and Pipe Band. On the second day of President Wilson's visit Mr. Paton again had a splendid view of the great procession from the old Guildhall, and was seated within half a yard of Mr. Lloyd George. The people fairly went wild over the Prime Minister and surged round him. Mr. Paton afterwards proceeded to Edinburgh, Glasgow and Paisley. Things have changed considerably since Mr. Paton's last visit. Women are now doing all kinds of work and many queer costumes are worn by them. Food rationing is an innovation which visitors feel hard to get accustomed to. They must produce a coupon for most necessities and in addition must carry their own sugar as there is none supplied by the Hotels. As for butter the quantity that is put down for breakfast one could put in his eye and not feel it. Prince Edward Island has much to be thankful for compared with Britain so far as comfort and food are concerned even now that the war is over. Mr. Paton enclosed one of the Emergency Ration cards, penalty for the misuse of which are 500.00 or six months imprisonment or both, and the authorities do not fail to enforce them when necessary. The weather in London had been cool and wet.

A SAD AFFLICTION.—The heartfelt sympathy of a host of friends of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Lawless, of Graham's Road is extended to them in the sad affliction they are compelled to bear on account of the sudden and unsuspected death of their two daughters which occurred in Cambridge, Mass., recently. Their daughter Pearle, aged about twenty-two years, left her home only a few weeks ago to visit her sister who resided in Cambridge, and was but a short time there when she contracted the influenza malady, which caused her death on Monday last. Her sister Mary (Mrs. Mitchell) with whom she was staying, also contracted the disease and died on the following day. The remains of both arrived at Emerald Jet. on Thursday evening last, accompanied by their sisters Agnes and Laura, and were interred in St. James' Catholic cemetery on Friday morning. A large number of sympathizing friends followed the two hearsees to the church where the funeral obsequies were performed by the pastor, Rev. Father Murphy. Mr. and Mrs. Lawless and family have the sincere sympathy of the whole community in this their sad hour of distress. The bodies of their two estimable daughters now lie within sight of their former happy homes awaiting the final resurrection. May their souls rest in peace. —Com.
