The motorboat's cargo was believed to have been transferred from a vessel off East Point, P. E. I., to be landed on the Kent county coast and smuggled to the three Saint John River districts or through to the State of Maine.—St. John Telegraph Journal.

**Outlook For Maritimes Bright**

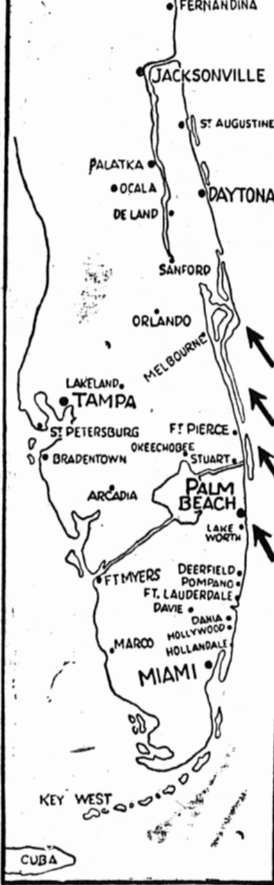
(Special to The Guardian)  
 HALIFAX, Aug. 14.—I have never seen the Maritime Provinces in such a condition of prosperity and courage as is manifested on all sides today, said Sir Henry Thornton, speaking before one of the most representative gatherings of Nova Scotians ever held in Halifax, the occasion being the laying of the cornerstone of the new cold storage plant, which is to be a mammoth adjunct to what are already declared to be one of the finest units of port equipment on the American continent. Continuing Sir Henry said: "You are entering upon a great period of great industrial and commercial activity all that is needed to bring into full provision that which is already under way, is co-operative effort and the abandonment of political cleavage." After sketching over the points of contact between the Canadian National Railway and the Maritimes, such as a special department of industrial research for the Maritime Provinces and the co-operation of the colonization and agricultural departments of the National system inducing settlement of the Maritime Provinces; said; in the year 1927 the Canadian National Railway system left in the hands of the people of the Maritime Provinces \$37,900,000 of that amount \$18,000,000 was expended in wages to the employees of the National Railway who are your citizens. The balance was spent in the purchase of land. Was it not then, he asked, worth while cultivating good will with respect to an institution that left thirty eight million dollars a year in these provinces. Preceding the laying of the cornerstone, a luncheon was held in one of the buildings more nearly completed than the others at which G. Fred Pearson, President of the Nova Scotia Cold Storage Terminals, Limited, presided and speakers included Hon. E. N. Rhodes, the Premier of Nova Scotia, George R. Graham, General Manager of the Dominion Atlantic Railway, George Henderson, President of the Montreal Board of Trade and Peter Jack, Chairman of the Halifax Harbor Commission.

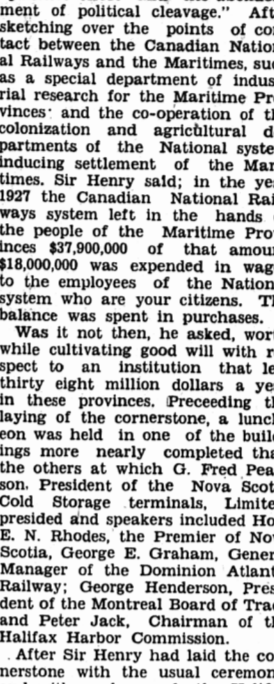

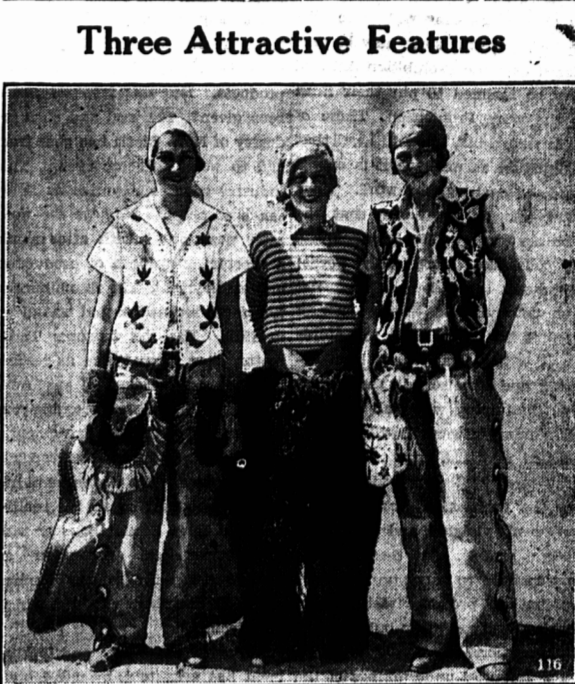
