

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THE MARKETS

MONTREAL Sept. 22—There was no actual change in the condition of the local egg situation yesterday, prices for the better grades being fully maintained with a steady demand for supplies for domestic consumption, but the market for the lower grades was easy on account of the offerings being in excess of the requirements. The receipts yesterday were 820 cases, as compared with 843 for the same day last week, and 650 for the corresponding day a year ago. The exports of eggs from here last week showed a decrease of 3,415 cases as compared with the previous week and a decrease of 7,470 cases with the same week last year, while the total shipments for the season to date are 49,275 cases smaller than the same period in 1920.

The market for maple product was without any new feature to note. The demand for supplies continues to be very limited, and business was quiet with maple syrup in a wholesale jobbing way quoted at \$1.45 to \$1.50 per tin of one gallon, and maple sugar at 15c to 17c per lb.

A steady feeling prevails in the market for potatoes under a slight improvement in the demand on account of the cooler weather prevailing, and a little more business was done in ear lots of choice stock at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per bag of 90 lbs. extract.
